

### THE CITY COUNCIL

**CITY FATHERS HOLD REGULAR WEEKLY SESSION LAST NIGHT.**

**Storm Drains on Broadway Hill Are Insufficient. Grand Army Encampment Coming. A Number of Street Improvements Ordered. Wants to Kill Off Rats.**

Just a quorum of the City Council was present last evening, but the usual amount of business was conducted.

William T. Cameron notified the council that the sewerage on the corner of Broadway and Fifth street, backed up into the cellars of his houses, and said if the council did not act, he would commence legal proceedings. Supt. McDougall explained that the fault was not with the sewer but that storm pipes from the houses led into the sewer instead of the storm drains. Mr. Cameron then addressed the council and stated that the pipes of the sewer were not large enough and he demanded redress. Superintendent McDougall is to make the necessary improvements.

The A. Zalk Co., of Astoria, offered to rid the city of rats, cockroaches and bugs, by selling to it their compound. Referred to the judiciary committee.

The judgment of the superior court in favor of J. A. Moller and against the city in the sum of \$5 and costs \$10.95 was received.

A communication was received from the Department of Washington and Alaska stating that the encampment of the G. A. R. would meet here on June 21, 1910. Referred to Councilman Quackenbush, Ingram and Crivya.

The property owners on the improved part of Second street, east of G street, asked that the street be paved instead of gravelled. Referred.

A light was ordered on the corner of Thornton and Sixth street.

The saloon license asked for by Anderson and Wadburg was granted.

The license asked for by the Combination saloon, was held up until the women now lodging on the upper floor of the building, be moved elsewhere.

Resolutions were passed for the improvement of Curtis street, from Clark to Lawrence street; Duffy street from Simpson Avenue to Fifth street, and Maple street from the present blanking on Simpson Avenue to the North side of Fifth street.

An ordinance for the improvement of Third street, from L street to Michigan Avenue, was passed.

The residents on First street, from Chicago Avenue East to the Wishkah river, asked that sidewalks on First street be extended from Chicago Avenue to the river.
