SOUTH SIDE TO RESCUE

Notwithstanding that the present has been one of the driest seasons in the history of this section, the city water supply has not been curtailed and consumers have had all the water necessary. This is directly ascribed to the foresightedness and judgment of a former water committee of the city council which installed the Charley Creek system on the south side and to Superintendent of Public Works George F. McDougall, who first offered a solution of the threatened water shortage a year ago and advised the construction of a new main across the Chehalis river, which would permit the use of the Charley Creek water on the north side. At the time these improvements were installed they were combated by many people, but the end has justified the means, according to the belief of people who have made a study of the proposition.

MAY SEND CAR EAST

Preliminary steps were taken at a meeting of the executive committee of the Southwestern Washington Development league at Centralia Thursday, which may result in the sending of an exhibition car filled with the products of southwestern Washington on a tour through the middle west and eastern states, during the coming winter. If the car is sent, each section of the state will be represented by its products and it is believed that it will prove of immense value in promoting the industries of the southwest and the attraction of capital to this section. It is planned to furnish a creditable exhibit from the Grays Harbor country, which will be gathered and arranged under the auspices of the allied commercial bodies of Aberdeen and Hoquiam.

NEW COMPANY OPERATES

With Jay D. Crary as manager and with local men and eastern capitalists interested, the Big Creek Timber company, capitalized at \$650,000, is now actively engaged in logging operations on Big Creek, a tributary of the Humpulips. The new company recently took over the logging property of the C. E. Burrows company, paying A. P. Stockwell and others interested with him \$300,000 for their interests. Mr. Stockwell reserving his boomage rights on the Humpulips and about 100,000,000 feet of standing timber. The incorporators of the Big Creek company are Jay D. Crary and J. B. Bridges of Aberdeen, J. B. Stone, of Seattle, and the Crarys of Warren, Pa.

MAY ENLARGE PLANT

On account of increased business and the need of still greater facilities, it is probable that the Union Cooperage company, in South Aberdeen, which has been in operation nearly a year, will, at an early date, install some extensive improvements at their plant, which will require the employment of double the present number of workmen. It is planned to add machinery for the manufacture of shingles, box shooks and veneering. Since the company first started it has met with great success and has enjoyed a highly profitable season. The plant resumed operations today after a shut down of a week for repairs.

ARREST CALIFORNIAN

Dean Herrick, wanted in San Francisco on a felony charge, was arrested Friday night by Detective K. Y. Church and lodged at the city police station pending the arrival of California officers. Herrick was arrested upon information supplied by the San Francisco police. Detective Church was detailed on the case by Chief Dean and soon had his man behind the bars. When first arrested the prisoner declared that his name was Wilson, but a search of his effects revealed his true name and clearly demonstrated that he was the man wanted.

SHOWS 'EM RAILROAD

A party of capitalists from Raymond and South Bend, headed by A. C. Little, of Raymond, were conducted over the lines of the Grays Harbor Railway and Light company Friday, by Jay D. Crary, former manager of the concern. The trip was made with the idea of showing the Willapa Harbor people the advantages of a street car system in developing any community. Mr. Crary and associates have recently applied for a franchise for the construction of a street car line between Raymond and South Bend.

EXAMINED SEWER SYSTEM

Under escort of City Engineer Charles W. Ewart, H. L. Gerwig, Arthur Dodwell and D. J. Olds, all members of the South Bend council, spent Saturday forenoon in a complete inspection of the city sewer system and the street pavements. The councilmen were sent here by the city of South Bend to inspect conditions and report relative to the advisability of installing municipal improvements in South Bend.
