MOOSE LODGE WILL BUILD

Big Lodge Decides Not to Divide, and to Erect Lodge Home Between Two Cities.

Deciding to hold together as one institution, members of the Grays Harbor lodge of Moose Friday night settled for some time, if not for all time, the matter of the lodge organization. It was also decided that a building suited to the purposes of the members who number nearly 1,000, must be erected and a building committee was given authority to procure plans and specifications for a building to be erected on a site between Aberdeen and Hoquiam to cost about \$50,000.

P. hall, Hoquiam, and the second and fourth Fridays in the K. P. Hall, Aberdeen. It is proposed to locate the building midway between Hoquiam and Aberdeen.
