

BOARD HOLDS MEETING.

HOQUIAM, Nov. 11.—A meeting of the board of directors of the National Lumber & Box Co. was held here today and a statement was given out that the mill will not resume operations until the market warrants its starting. Mack and W. J. Patterson, Aberdeen; Henry Wick, Youngstown, Ohio; W. J. C. Wick, Spokane. Mr. Mack and Mr. Patterson are new members of the board.

HOQUIAM DEFEATS CENTRALIA.

HOQUIAM, Nov. 11.—The Hoquiam High school football team won a victory from the heavy Centralia eleven today at the Electric park by a score of 5 to 0. The game was played in a blinding snow storm, the field being white with snow, which obliterated the side and yard lines. During the first half, Centralia played Hoquiam in its own territory, but as the game progressed Hoquiam showed better class. The score was the result of a fumbled punt, which Graham fell on and slid over the line for a touchdown.

HARBOR MAY SEND DELEGATE.

CLUBS MAY NOT FUSE.

HOQUIAM, Nov. 12.—While efforts are being made to unite the Commercial club and the Twenty-five Thousand club, indications point to possible failure of the plan. Members of the Twenty-five Thousand club say they do not propose to be swallowed up and want their organization to live. "The Twenty-five Thousand club was started for a purpose," said a member, "and since its birth, it has done good things for Hoquiam and has been the means of waking up the Commercial club, which under President Brewer's administration, has accomplished more good than in years. With this as its history, I see no use at this time of consolidation."

PRIMARY ELECTIONS.


WEDDING BELLS.






PIONEER PASSES AWAY.

Robert H. Strong, Pioneer of Chehalis County, Dies at His Home in Elma.

ELMA, Nov. 10.—Robert Strong, one the best known and best liked men in Elma, died at his home, the Pioneer Hotel, last Saturday morning. Mr. Strong had been in poor health for a number of years and in recent months his condition became so bad that his death became only a matter of time. His ailment was Bright's disease compounded with dropsy and heart trouble. During his illness he was given the most careful attention by his wife, his relatives and his many friends, but he was beyond help and it was written that his time had come. Mr. Strong was a native of Ontario, Canada, and was a resident of Chehalis county for 30 years. He is survived by his wife and two children, Mrs. E. W. McDougall and Rex Strong. The funeral was held in the Episcopal church on Sunday afternoon, and the burial took place in the Odd Fellows cemetery. Mr. Strong was an Episcopalian all his life and was raised in that faith. He joined the Odd Fellows 38 years ago, and was a member of Olympia No. 1. He was also a Mason for about 20 years. He had a great memory for faces and names, and was full of anecdotes of the pioneer days that he recounted to the oldtimers.
