ELMA AND OAKVILLE.

State Bureau of Inspection Finds Chehalis County Towns in Fine Condition.

OLYMPIA, Nov. 11.—The report for the town of Elma, Chehalis county, has been filed by the state bureau of inspection with the attorney general. This municipality is reported in unusually good condition financially, its assets being \$41,164.59 in excess of its liabilities. Outstanding warrants amount to \$10.45 and the bills payable total \$584.41. To meet this there is \$1,429.42 cash on hand.

A new water system will be installed soon, a bond issue of \$10,000 having recently been voted. The books of Elma were found to be in generally good condition.

Slight recommendations are made with regard to the police judge's office. He had been in the habit of reimbursing himself out of the costs and turning over to the treasurer the fines.

The cost of examination was \$61.55, while it covers the period from January 1, 1907, to October 1, 1911.

The state bureau also reported on the town of Oakville, Chehalis county, today, the report declaring the municipality in a flourishing condition. Its assets are \$4,286.58 larger than its liabilities, the total outstanding indebtedness consisting of a warrant for \$8.50 and \$25.85 due the treasurer which he has not collected.

Oakville Has \$1,479.11 in Bank. The town has \$1,479.11 to its credit in the bank. Interest has never been collected on the town's deposits. The records of the town have been kept in a conscientious manner and only a few small changes are recommended. The examination cost \$27.95 and reaches from March, 1905, to October, 1911.

BEGIN WORK ON PLANT.

Standard Oil Company Commences Clearing Land for \$150,000 Investment to Be Made.

Initial steps in making Aberdeen the distributing point for the Standard Oil company, and the construction of oil tanks, reservoirs and docks, aggregating an expenditure of \$150,000, have been taken by the company. The company, through its representatives, recently purchased a tract of land and river front near the east end of the county trestle for \$7,500, and a crew is ready to begin clearing the ground for the buildings to be erected. The company will make Aberdeen an independent station and from this point all vessels desiring oil for fuel or gasoline, etc., will receive it at this station. The improvement is one of great importance to Aberdeen and is the best evidence that capital is looking this way and sees in Grays Harbor a golden opportunity.

Mrs. F. W. Loomis Prepares Excellent Paper on Commission Form of Government for Club.

At a meeting of the Friends in Council last Tuesday afternoon the feature of the session was a highly interesting paper on the Commission Form of Government by Mrs. F. W. Loomis. Mrs. W. O. McCaw also read a fine paper on the councilmanic system, under which Aberdeen is now operating.

Mrs. Loomis brought forth the advantages of the new form of government and its better points over the present system. She told why Aberdeen should adopt it and after her paper had been read, the members present were better informed on the new system of government. Mrs. C. W. McKinlay spoke on the matter, and also reviewed a number of ordinances pertaining to the welfare of women and children.

The meeting was one of the most interesting held in a long time.

POULTRY SHOW IS TOPIC OF HARBOR.

Interest in the coming poultry show at Hoquiam November 30 and December 1 and 2, is increasing and poultry men of this city have had their choice birds in the pens getting them in shape for the exhibition. The process of bringing chickens up to weight, washing and drying and putting on the fancy flourishes that make a bird look its best requires some skill. There is no question but what the coming show will be a big event in the poultry world and the entries will be close to 1,000. With hundreds of local parties ready to enter their birds, and poultrymen of the state coming to show the people of Grays Harbor what they have, the competition will be brisk. The spirit of rivalry is friendly and the awarding of the cups will be made on merits. Judge William Coates, of Vancouver, comes well recommended, and he will give all a fair show. The prize cups to be given by the Commercial bodies of Chehalis county will be awarded only to Chehalis county exhibitors.

FRENCH STUDENT'S BALL

Masquerade Ball at Pavilion Thanksgiving Eve. Seems to Be Misunderstood By Many

The masked ball to be given on the evening of Wednesday, November 29, at Electric park will be an ordinary social affair and conducted in the most proper manner, notwithstanding the slurring insinuations of the morning paper, says the Grays Harbor News. The promoters of the affair are naturally very indignant over the article appearing in the morning paper as it was without the slightest foundation and was written evidently without any attempt at an investigation. The statement to the effect that the commissioners were intending to investigate the affair is too silly to notice and was evidently inspired by the fact that no advertising had been forthcoming. The dance will be held as scheduled and will without doubt be very enjoyable and well conducted.

An article in a Hoquiam paper caused the promoters of the ball to interview Mayor Ferguson, and explain the kind of entertainment they intended to give. To which the mayor replied, "We do not interfere with entertainments unless we find that they are contrary to our ordinances. We do not sanction anything that we believe injurious to our community. We do not interfere unless we have a right to."

The management informs the Herald that all tickets issued are good and will be honored at the door, reports to the contrary notwithstanding, and that 1,000 costumes will be here from Seattle for the occasion.

UNUSUAL STORM ON HARBOR

Mantle of Snow Which Covers Harbor for Days, Vanishes After Night Rain

The earliest snow storm in the history of Chehalis county, and the temperature ranging lower than the coldest spell of last year, were two unusual weather experiences suffered by Grays Harbor residents last week. Snow began falling Wednesday evening and by morning the ground was white. Thursday was cold and an east wind swept the harbor. Friday considerable snow fell but the weather was too cold for ground thaw. Saturday a blizzard raged until 11 o'clock in the evening, when it began to rain and by morning the ground was nearly shed of its coats. Seven inches of snow fell, while the coldest night was Friday when the temperature went down to 18 above zero. The rain storms of last night and this morning were the heaviest of this season.
