The barkentine Benecia is tied up at the Union mill until after the first of the year.

The schooner Lizzie Vance is at the Grays Harbor Commercial company mill at Cosmopolis.

The schooner Taurus arrived this morning from Tal Tal, Chili and is in the stream awaiting orders.

The barkentine Newsboy, which arrived Saturday, is at the Endresen's shipyards having a new mizzen mast installed.

The steamer Doris finished loading a cargo of lumber at the Aberdeen Lumber & Shingle company mill and sailed Saturday for San Francisco.
