### PACKET STEAMER SECURED.

Steamship With Accommodations for 50 Passengers Being Built at San Francisco for Route.

After an agitation of several years, the campaign of education inaugurated by the commercial organizations of Grays Harbor, in the effort to impress the financial possibilities of a packet steamer line between San Francisco and Grays Harbor, is about to bear fruit. Word has been received that a steamship with all modern conveniences known to ocean travel, and with a capacity of 50 passengers, is now being built at San Francisco by Wilson Bros. & company, the Aberdeen and San Francisco lumber and shipping firm.

The new vessel is expected to establish an eight-day service between Aberdeen and San Francisco, and to make the voyage from port to port in 50 hours.

### "PLAY BALL"

Mayor Parks Will Pitch First Ball of League Season at Electric Park May 2.

Since Aberdeen, after mature deliberation, decided to enter the Washington State League of baseball there has been no hesitancy or halt in the matter of preparing to give the people of Grays Harbor some classy ball playing, and the season will open at Electric park next Thursday.
