ESTABLISH NIGHT SCHOOL

School Board Votes to Aid Adult Foreigners in Acquiring Knowledge of the English Language

The city school board by unanimous vote Tuesday evening decided to open a free night school in the Franklin building. The decision came as a result of a petition signed by 300 asking that the action be taken. The school will be opened immediately and teachers furnished.

Mr. W. J. Patterson, chairman of the school board, in speaking of the matter said Saturday, "The petitioners agreed to furnish students from among the adult population who desire to learn English and improve their general knowledge. The school board feels that an honest desire to improve one's mind should be aided by the community. Our attorney looked into the legality of the move and decided that the city could expend money to hire school teachers to train adults. Should the classes that are formed be kept up, the night school will be a permanent feature. There will be from 1 1/2 to 2 hours instruction, 5 nights of each week. Mr. Patterson has a theory that the city should build a public building containing a natatorium, bowling alley, and play rooms for the adult population that have no club rooms. "I believe," said Mr. Patterson, "that this plan would aid in overcoming agitation and further believe that public buildings of this kind are right in line with the march of progress. I hope some day to see Aberdeen take this matter up."
