The KITCHEN CUPBOARD

FRUIT COMPOTES

COMPOTES are fruits in sirup served in such a way as to preserve their forms, either whole, halved or quartered. Some recipes for delicious compotes are given here:

Cream and Berries. Strawberry Compote—Take a pint of fresh solid berries, sprinkle over them one cupful of powdered sugar. Dissolve a tablespoonful of gelatin in a little warm water. Crush one cupful of stale sponge cake crumbs. Mix the gelatin, berries and crumbs and turn into a mold. Whip one cupful of cream until stiff. When the fruit gelatin is firm dip by the spoonful into a glass dish, alternating with spoonfuls of cream until the dish is full. Finish with the cream and a few whole and perfect berries.

Apples in Sirup. Apple Compote—Pare and remove the cores from six large apples, throwing them into cold water with lemon juice. Then blanch in the same water till tender enough to show if pressed with the finger. Lift out the apples and arrange on the dish on which they are to be served.

Make a sirup of loaf sugar, using one lump to each apple and either lemon or vanilla flavor. Boil all together until thick and pour it over and around the apples. Serve with or without cream.

This Looks Handsome. Rhubarb Compote—Take nice, well colored and thick stalks of rhubarb. Cut it into lengths of four or five inches. Put into a saucepan two pounds of sugar with a pint of water. Bring to the boiling point and skim. Then boil the sirup till it is quite thick. Add the rhubarb and simmer gently till soft. Lift each length carefully and lay it on a glass dish, then boil the sirup for a few minutes longer. Let it cool, then add a few drops of red coloring and pour over the rhubarb.

This is Basted. Banana Compote—Take the skin off your bananas, cut them crossways and lengthwise. Lay these strips in a baking dish. Pour over them, for each banana, two tablespoonfuls of water, one of sugar, one teaspoonful of butter, melted, the juice of one lemon and a small pinch of salt. Bake slowly for half an hour, basting constantly, until the fruit is red and the juice is thick. Serve very hot.
