American Judges Have Usurped Rights of the People

If the supreme court of the United States has the power to annul acts of congress it is itself not merely a judicial, but a lawmaking power of the first consequence, for it is the final, THE SOVEREIGN AUTHORITY. This is a tremendous authority. The right to annul the law or to change it—as by judicial decision the fourteenth amendment to the United States constitution has been vitally and, as I hold, lamentably changed—is the RIGHT TO GOVERN.

For sixty years the greatest presidents, Jefferson, Jackson and Abraham Lincoln, opposed this doctrine as laid down by the supreme court. It seems to me, however, that they never any of them, not even Lincoln, formulated the right theory of opposition to the doctrine.

INVADER OF THE TRANSVAAL

The Once Famous Dr. Jameson Made Head of a South African Company. Sir Leander Starr Jameson, doctor, pioneer, leader of the famous raid which prefaced the Boer war and premier of Cape Colony from 1904 to 1908, has found a fresh field for his energies as head of the Chartered Company of South Africa, which has millions of acres of grazing land that it plans to turn into ranches.

Jameson, as a young doctor, went to South Africa when he was told that his

lungs could not stand the climate of England. At Cape Town he became the leading surgeon, and gossip credited him with an income of £10,000 a year. But he gave up his practice to ally himself with the empire builder, Cecil Rhodes. Alone and unarmed, Jameson traveled to the court of the powerful and dreaded Matabele chief, Lobengula, and gained from him concessions which meant enormous wealth for Rhodes' company.

In 1896 came Jameson's ill-fated invasion of the Transvaal, which ended in the capture of the leader, his being sent to England for trial, his imprisonment to penal servitude and his release after a breakdown in health. His own view of the raid was once given as follows:

"A revolution, to be justified, must be successful. Ours was not. I made a mistake, and I got fifteen months. I deserved fifteen years—for failure." Jameson entered the Cape parliament in 1900. He was the author of important reforms, especially in the treatment of the Dutch after the Boer war. He was knighted in 1911.

THE KAISER'S TREAT.

What an Invitation to His "Bier-abend" Really Means.

The kaiser had not come, and the atmosphere was not exactly jovial. The emperor entered, beaming. "Good evening, gentlemen!" he said enthusiastically.
