CARNIVAL CLOSES Rice-Dore Carnival Closes Week of Bad Weather But Fair Attendance, Saturday Night Despite the showery weather of the week, the Rice-Dore Water Carnival closed a fairly successful week in Aberdeen Saturday night, and the Splash committee of the Chamber of Commerce will net \$500 or \$600 out of the proceeds as a nucleus of the Splash fund. The carnival as conducted by Rice & Dore was the best ever brought to Grays Harbor, and contained the fewest objectionable features. The splash committee looked after the affair closely and permitted no fraud or sharp practices, which are so frequently the accompaniments of street carnivals. Capt. Alfred Henderson of Hoquiam easily defeated LaPrairie, the much touted log roller with the Rice & Dore company, in the contest at Aberdeen Saturday night. The men rolled for five minutes, and when the whistle blew to stop Henderson said: "We're going to roll the log some." At the end of four minutes more the Indian stepped from the log to the side of the tank, tired out. Henderson then rolled an exhibition match with Frye, also of Hoquiam, winning easily.

MAN OVERBOARD G. Lindholm, Second Mate of Schooner A. B. Jackson, Loses Life on Grays Harbor Bar As the schooner A. B. Jackson was crossing the bar, going to sea Friday, bound for Sidney, New South Wales, G. Lindholm, second mate, was swept overboard and drowned. The mate was securing the anchor when the schooner was struck by a huge wave, listing the vessel to starboard, causing Lindholm to lose his balance and fall overboard. The unfortunate man was 37 years of age, and had followed the sea for many years.

AIR TANK EXPLODES Explosion of Air Tank Creates Excitement at Broadway and Heron Street Saturday The explosion of a 200-gallon air tank used for inflating tires, at the store of the Aberdeen Electric company in the Smits building, caused a commotion in that vicinity Saturday and slightly injured Frank Cooper, who was entering a small rear room, where the tank was kept, when the explosion occurred. He was thrown to the floor and his eyes filled with dust. The principal damage was to a few bottles of perfume and drugs thrown from the shelves of the Broadway Pharmacy company, in the adjoining store room. The tank was an old one with rusted and weakened spots along the seams. Pressure of only 80 pounds was shown a few moments before the explosion. The explosion caused quite a crowd to gather.

SECOND RECEIVER NAMED FOR HOQUIAM DAIRY Receiver Named By the Federal Court Supercedes Appointee of the Superior Court A petition in bankruptcy having been filed in the United States district court against the Hoquiam Dairy & Ice Cream company, by Attorneys Martin F. Smith and George D. Abel, in behalf of part of the creditors, Judge E. E. Cushman issued an order at Tacoma Saturday upon motion of Mr. Smith, appointing Attorney W. E. Campbell receiver to succeed Claud Wood, appointed receiver by the superior court. The receiver's bond was fixed at \$5,000. A restraining order was also issued enjoining the sale of the company's property, which was to have taken place at Montesano Saturday. Assets of the company are estimated at \$3500 and liabilities about \$16,000. Creditors of the company applied for a receivership and secured the appointment of Mr. Wood, the manager, as receiver. When the case was taken out of the hands of the superior court yesterday, Wood was relieved of his duties and turned the keys to the plant over to Mr. Campbell. Miss Blanche Beavor, Hoquiam's contestant, was the student to bring this honor to Hoquiam.
