DENTISTS WILL GATHER Washington State Dental Association Will Open Convention in Aberdeen Next Monday The State Dental association will hold its annual convention in Aberdeen next week, in the J. M. Weatherwax High school building, commencing Monday morning at 9 o'clock and continuing three days. The session will be devoted chiefly to scientific lecture and clinical work and but a small portion of the three days' session will be given over to entertainments. Among the medical men of note present will be Dr. Alfred Owre, of Minneapolis; Dr. Herbert G. Samuels of Oakland, Cal.; Dr. Forrest H. Orton, of St. Paul; Dr. G. Maurice Crow, of Los Angeles, and Dr. Clyde Davis, Dean of the Lincoln Dental school, of Lincoln, Neb. The sessions will be held in the high school building which will be fitted up into dental laboratories. The mornings will be devoted chiefly to lecture work and afternoons to clinics. Ten dental exhibitions will be in operation at one time and delegates will be given an opportunity to witness every phase of modern dental work. The exhibitions will be under the supervision of dentists coming from all parts of the state.

GAME BIRDS AND FISH Game Warden Esses has stocked the Wishkah and Neushkah rivers with 15,000 cut throat trout and has placed about \$150 worth of birds on the preserve at the Grays Harbor County club preserve. More trout will be furnished this fall by the state hatcheries and about \$500 more will be available for game birds. 

REMODEL CRESCENT BLOCK New Owners of Crescent Hotel Building Will Transform It into an Apartment House Plans have been drawn by Seattle architects for remodeling the Crescent hotel block, Market and H streets. The building will be transformed into a modern apartment house at a cost estimated at \$20,000. The second floor will be turned into eight modern apartment suites, and no expense will be spared to make them first class in every detail. The lower floor will be divided in six small stores which may be used as stores or offices and the former grill on Market street will be remodelled so as to correspond to the general plan of the interior of the entrance and upper story and a first class cafe will be maintained. The corner entrance to the store occupied by Jones & Jones will be changed and the Jones & Jones office divided into two stores. The exterior of the building is to be scraped and covered with water proofing. The interior walls of the lower floor and all the walls of the upper floor are to be made entirely new and water proof.
