Leader—It looks like this (gives a gentle push with the right shoulder). This is all the game, as you will plainly see, and if you do not laugh ill natured you will be.

**SUMMER AWNINGS.**  
They Should Be Attractive as Well as Convenient.  
The style and color of awnings should be studied so that a pleasing effect from a distance will be the result of their use. Striped awnings are generally popular, especially those of green and blue, with white and buff with red. These stripes are to be found in several widths. A brown and buff combination is a wise selection for the brown bungalow or shingled house in a rambling style of architecture.  
A recent departure which promises to be more than popular, even though it is more expensive, is the plain white canvas on which the stripe or design is painted. This style allows a chance for individuality of taste. When the design on white or cream is used the under side is usually painted over with a restful soft green. Authorities say that these painted canvas shades last longer than the ordinary coarsely woven awnings.  
In ordering awnings one is apt to decide on a stripe and not designate the width. If a house is of extensive dimensions and stands at the end of a long avenue, drive or walk and is well surrounded with foliage a wide stripe is most effective, while a smaller house with a limited approach calls for a narrow stripe or even a plain material.  
Several new awning devices have been brought out. One for use with the casement window which opens outward has a frame with an extra rib or rod near the top, which holds the canvas high and gives freedom to the window.

## THE EIGHT-HOUR BILL

It Strikes Labor a Hard Blow and Will Deprive Many of Work.  
Initiative Measure No. 13 prohibits employers from requiring or permitting employes to work more than eight hours in any day of twenty-four hours nor more than forty-eight hours in any week of seven days, except that agricultural laborers may be permitted to work ten hours in a day where such work is necessarily incidental to farm management; provided, however, that in case of extraordinary emergency endangering life or property, laborers may be permitted to work overtime, but shall receive therefor one and one-half times the rate of wage ordinarily allowed.  
What does "incidental to farm management" mean?  
Under this bill, no farmer will be allowed to work employes more than eight hours in cultivating the soil or harvesting crops of any kind.  
The general prosperity of the state depends upon its agriculture, timber and fisheries.  
These three great industries are the business backbone of the state.  
Farm and fisheries products are perishable and must be harvested when nature demands.  
Timber operations must be carried on principally during the summer season.  
If Initiative Bill No. 13 becomes a law, where will the additional labor be procured?  
Every person in the state knows that the labor supply is insufficient during the summer season.  
This bill applies to all classes of employment, whether skilled or unskilled, whether physical or mental, whether the work be heavy or light, agreeable or disagreeable, performed in the home, the factory, the store, the office, the hospital, the hotel, the forest or on the railway train, street car or the steamboat.  
The less labor performed, the less wealth produced. There would be no more cloth in the world by measuring it with a yard stick of thirty inches. The proponents of this bill are suggesting to the wage earner that he lift himself out of his present condition by his boot straps.  
This measure is vicious. It takes away the workman's freedom of contract and in many instances would deprive him of the right to earn the comforts of life for himself and his family.  
If any man who is physically able desires to work ten hours or twelve hours per day, it is not within the legitimate province of any government to deny him that privilege.

## THE BLUE SKY LAW

known as the Blue Sky Law) is evidently intended to prevent fraud in the sale of stocks, bonds, securities and lands.  
The bill is loosely drawn and so ambiguous that it will undoubtedly require lengthy and costly litigation to interpret it.  
The prosperity of this state depends upon the influx of new capital. Anything tending toward retarding this progress should be discouraged.  
The provisions of this bill manifestly will prevent the free conduct of legitimate business. It provides for voluminous statements under oath, both when a corporation is organized and whenever any securities are offered by such corporation.  
If it only reached the illegitimate or get-rich-quick and fraudulent concerns, it would not be objectionable, but it assails the honest business as well as the dishonest.  
The vice of the bill is that it treats the honest and the dishonest alike. It would be far better to go at once to the root of the matter and prohibit or penalize to the extent of imprisonment, the exploitation of dishonest schemes.  
If this "Blue Sky" measure becomes a law, the development of our resources will be stifled and the growth of commercial necessities retarded by driving away investment capital so urgently and absolutely necessary. Money for legitimate purposes is none too easy to secure now, owing to the constantly increasing fear of financial legislation. If this bill is passed, it will be still harder for legitimate enterprises to procure money for its development.
