HOQUIAM, July 9.—Contract for construction of a 20-foot asphaltic concrete pavement on Aberdeen avenue between Twenty-second and Twenty-eighth streets, was awarded yesterday by the city commissioners to Pugh & Arenz, contractors of Montesano, at a total price of \$15,880.80. Two other companies bid on the work, P. L. Granstrom of this city, \$16,728.60; and the Cascade Construction company of Aberdeen, \$17,148.60.

HOQUIAM, July 9.—A burglar gaining entrance by breaking a window in the rear of Hudson & Bell's smoke and billiard store, 403 Eighth street, about 1 o'clock yesterday morning, rifled the cash drawer in the front of the store, taking about \$43 in gold and small change. The burglar left no clue for the police to work on. Three men were arrested last night on suspicion, but the police have no evidence against them.

HOQUIAM POSTOFFICE

HOQUIAM, July 9.—Completion of the annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1914, was announced yesterday by Postmaster R. L. Philbrick, showing total receipts of \$26,127.16. This is an increase of 15 per cent over last year's receipts, which totaled \$22,800.78.

Brown, lately a logger but formerly well known in Alaska and before that in New York, was found near the trail that leads from the Hewitt logging camp to Satsop this afternoon. An empty whiskey jug, sitting in the shade of a log near by, probably tells the tale. Sheriff Mathews says the body looked as if Brown had laid down to sleep after the last drink and had never waked up. He left the camp yesterday about noon. He was about 60 years of age.

HOQUIAM, July 9.—Bids have been called by the Northern Pacific railroad company for construction of a railroad bridge across the Hoquiam river near the plant of the Hoquiam Lumber & Shingle company to connect the west side yards of the city with the Lytle free factory site district northeast of the Hoquiam river. As soon as the contract is let, work will be started at once. The bridge will be used by the three railroads running into this city.

CALL FOR DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

A Democratic State Convention is hereby called to meet at the Armory, in the city of Seattle, at eleven o'clock a. m. on Saturday the 18th day of July, 1914, for the purpose of settling forth a declaration of principles and to adopt a platform, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before it.

The basis of representation in the state convention shall be three delegates at large from each county and one delegate for each 100 votes, or major fraction thereof, cast for Woodrow Wilson for President in the election of 1912.

The number of delegates to which each county is entitled under the above basis of representation is as follows:

It is recommended that the delegates to the state convention be selected in mass conventions held in each county on Saturday, July 11, but any county committee may choose another date if more convenient. It is further recommended that the several county committees meet with the county conventions for the purpose of perfecting the local party organization.

The present county central committees are directed to carry the provisions of this call into effect.
