State Democratic Platform

The full text of the democratic platform is as follows:
The democracy of the state of Washington, in convention assembled, once more proudly declares its allegiance to the principles of the democratic party as first formulated by the immortal Jefferson; and further declares the reasons why the people of this state and nation should continue it in power in the nation, and place it in control of the state to the end that the common welfare shall obtain in all branches of our government.
In November, 1912, at a time when this nation had long been burdened with the misdeeds, mistakes and misgovernment of the leaders of the republican party, and distressed almost beyond endurance by republican misrule; when a mighty protest against the long domination of the trusts and the money monopoly was convulsing our country, and the grip of the republican party of 1907 was still on us; when thousands of mills and factories were closed and millions of American men and women were tramping our streets workless and in want, and hope of relief seemed far off—then the American people established a "new freedom" dedicated to the higher things of humanity.
It is with no mere pride, but with enthusiastic praise that we point to the splendid achievements of this great democratic administration, our president and his patriotic co-workers in congress, nor would we restrict the glory to members of the democratic party only; we honor as well those members of congress of other political faiths who caught the vision and joined with us in the mighty work of redemption and regeneration.

Jones, and the republican congressmen from this state in their vicious and unwarranted assaults upon an administration that has done more for this state, Alaska and the Northwest, than has been done by the republican party during its entire existence.
