PRAY FOR PEACE

Churches Filled With Crowds Sunday, in Answer to Call of President and Governor

With practically every church in the city, irrespective of denomination, in response to President Wilson's Peace Sunday proclamation, Aberdeen gave itself over Sunday to a prayerful protest against the great European war.

At the First Baptist church "Peace" was the subject of Rev. Thomas Broomfield's morning service and "Some Great Things, Including Peace," his evening one. At the First Presbyterian church, Rev. T. H. Simpson spoke in the morning on "Civilization Found Wanting," and in the evening on "In the Fields at Eventide."

At the morning service at the First Methodist church a prayer for peace in Europe was made, followed by an exposition of the President's proclamation. At the evening service Rev. J. T. McQueen spoke on "A Man as a Hiding Place."

At the First Congregational church Rev. Charles McDermoth spoke at the morning service on "The European War—Some Lessons From It." The evening service was in the Finnish language.

The morning service at the Episcopal church featured a sermon on "Peace," by Rev. F. F. W. Greene, and music by Mrs. W. Y. Croxall. The Masonic order attended the Episcopal services in a body and several of the other fraternal orders are expected to attend also.

SHERIFF HAD 277 PRISONERS IN PAST

MONTESANO, Oct. 5.—The sheriff's annual report of the jail, out and filed with county and officials Oct. 1, shows there been 227 prisoners taken into custody during the year. Five of these were arrested for murder, 21 for assault, 10 for assault, 40, including the four Elma bank robbers, for burglary, several were vagrants and others were for almost all sorts of crimes.

The report shows 2287 days work have been done by the prisoners, mostly on county roads. The work is valued at \$5717.50.

Among the notes of the report tells that a small circulating library has been installed during the year. It is made up mostly of good fiction. At the time the report was made out 17 prisoners were still in custody at the jail as against seven year ago.
