JETTY STONE HERE BY JUNE 28

Hercules Sandstone Company Will Start Delivery of 180,000 Tons of Rock Within Two Weeks.

H. P. Scheel, of the Hercules Sandstone company of Tenino, who was in the city last week, says his concern will start delivery of the 180,000 tons of rock for the North jetty not later than June 28. At the price stipulated in the contract with the government, \$155 at the jetty, per ton, Scheel expects to exceed the contract by 20 per cent, if the government will receive the extra rock. He figures on delivering 1,600 tons of rock daily at the South Aberdeen docks, and thence to the jetty. The new quarry opened for the contract is 14 miles from Tenino on the Skookumchuck river.

SUIT OVER DOCK SETTLED

The Hercules Sandstone company had started suit against the Grays Harbor Construction company for alleged use, without permission, of the South Aberdeen rock spur, in handling stone for the Cascade Contract company, but the case last week was settled out of court.

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TO MARK RESERVOIR OPENING

Dedication of the Fairview reservoir to the use of the city will be marked by a public celebration, which likely will take the form of a dance on the reservoir floor, to be given early in July, according to present plans of the city council.

Arthur DeGibault, barber of this city, was committed to the Fort Steilacoom hospital for the insane, Wednesday, after examination before Judge Mason Irwin. It had been hoped by DeGibault's family and friends that his condition had improved sufficiently to allow of his remaining at home, but a recent relapse rendered advisable further care at the Fort Steilacoom institution.
