This Big Institution Will Be Opened to the Public Next Saturday Morning, August 7th

At last Aberdeen joins the ranks of the 20th century up-to-date cities. On Saturday morning, August 7th, the Aberdeen Public Market in the Livingston Building, on Heron street, will be opened to the public for regular business.

NEW BRITISH LIQUOR RULE BARS TREATS AND CREDIT.

Besides limiting the hours during which liquor may be sold in taverns where the English government has taken over control of the sale of liquors, the board of control appointed to deal with the munitions areas has ordered that there shall be no treating and has prohibited the giving of credit for liquor.

The sale of liquor in licensed houses is permitted only between the hours of noon and 2:30 p. m. and between 8 and 9 o'clock in the evening. No orders may be given or accepted for spirits to be consumed off the premises on Saturdays and Sundays and only between noon and 2:30 p. m. on other days.

The penalty for contravention of the regulations is fixed at six months' imprisonment and a fine of \$500.
