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How does the government issue postage stamps? Is there a value besides the paper and labor in making them before they are put in circulation? Postage stamps are prepared in the bureau of printing and engraving in Washington, and that bureau is the only one prepared to furnish details concerning the cost of production of postage stamps. Generally speaking the money value indicated by the denomination of a stamp is an entirely arbitrary value, since in itself a stamp is worth only the value of the paper and the cost of labor entering into its production.

Can you inform me what government position Carl Schurz held under President R. B. Hayes? Secretary of the interior.

Please tell me something about the island of Porto Rico, its area, population, distance from some points in the United States, resources, etc. How long has it belonged to the United States?

Porto Rico became a possession of the United States following the war with Spain Oct. 18, 1898. It contains about 3,600 miles. A census taken in 1900 showed a population of 953,243, of whom 589,428 were white and 363,817 were colored. The population in 1910 is reported as 1,118,012. The island is unusually fertile, and its principal industries are agriculture and lumbering. There are more than 500 varieties of trees found in the forests, and the plains are full of palm, orange and other trees.

The principal crops are sugar, coffee, tobacco and corn, but oranges, bananas, rice, pineapples and many other fruits are important products. The largest export is sugar and the next is tobacco. Other exports in order of amount are coffee, fruits, molasses, cattle, timber and hides. San Juan, the capital of the island, is 1411 miles from New York, 1,200 miles from Charleston, S. C. and 1,050 miles from Key West, Fla.
