WASHINGTON STATE NEWS OF INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Briefly Sketched for Information of Our Readers.

Salmon fishing is again improving with the falling water in the Columbia.

Governor Lister addressed the Clark County Veterans' association at Orford.

W. Pettijohn, aged 68, former sheriff, police judge and justice of Montesano, is dead.

Harvesting in the Palouse will commence about July 25, three weeks later than usual.

The cannery at Chehalis is busy these days on loganberries, raspberries and cherries.

Toledo has launched a movement toward the organization of a militia company in the town.

Only two democrats have so far announced themselves as candidates for office in Yakima county.

The Marcus school board has engaged Charles H. Schuele of Pullman as principal of the high school.

The first annual meeting of the White Salmon Valley Growers' association was held last Saturday.

Favorable weather the past week has improved crop conditions materially in the Walla Walla section.

It was decided at a meeting of the Centralia commercial club to hold a chautauqua in Centralia next year.

The United States cruiser New Orleans has sailed from Puget Sound with the Washington naval militia.

Dr. George M. Horton of Seattle was elected president of the Washington State Medical association for the year 1917.

Rev. A. H. Chittenden of the Presbyterian church of Chehalis has been presented with an automobile by his friends.

R. B. Haley's general merchandise store at Adna, six miles west of Chehalis, burned. The stock was valued at \$9000.

The Rhodes Harvester company was recently organized in Colfax for the manufacture of the Rhodes combine harvester.

Walla Walla valley will export \$350,000 worth of onions this summer, according to the estimate of growers and shippers.

Mayor A. V. Fawcett of Tacoma has filed his declaration as candidate for representative in congress on the republican ticket.

A. C. Canterbury, Lewis county superintendent of schools, announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for re-election.

Benjamin L. Tweed, the 23-year old postmaster at Waverly, in Spokane county, is missing with an alleged shortage of approximately \$400.

The new St. Mary's hospital at Walla Walla, the largest and most costly building in southeastern Washington, will be completed about August 11.

The Pacific Highway between Kalama and Carrolls is a quagmire on account of the high water in the Columbia river backing up the Kalama.

Sergeants Cooper and Olson and Musician Draper have been named as drill sergeants for the new provisional company being organized in Centralia.

The postoffice safe at Rosalia was blown open, the crackers obtaining about \$30 in cash. Postmaster Arthur Stanley Jr. said no stamps were taken.

The seven months' old baby boy of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Wrenn of Monroe is dead, following a collision between his go-cart and an automobile truck.

Only the presence of mind and bravery of Harry Porter, age 12, saved his mother, Mrs. William Porter, and Roy Edgecomb from drowning near Pullman.

A wind and electric storm did considerable damage in and around Medical Lake. Winter wheat was knocked down and damage was done to out-buildings.

A striking longshoreman was shot at Eleventh and Pacific avenue, in the heart of the business section of Tacoma, by a special deputy, and badly wounded.

Fifteen socials at 15 schoolhouses throughout Clarke county were given Saturday, July 15, by the 15 canning clubs organized among the school children of the county.

Five Confederate veterans of Centralia were the guests at a dinner given by C. L. Randle, a Union veteran, who was a member of company E, 2d Tennessee infantry.

A county republican club was formed at Lone with County Chairman E. I. Jones of Newport, president, and Arnold Reading, secretary of the county central committee, secretary.

The program has been announced for the next meeting of the Lewis County Interdenominational Sunday School association, which will be held in Pe Ell on August 23 and 24.

The Puyallup valley is shipping 10 to 12 cars of raspberries daily. Each car contains from 600 to 700 crates. They are consigned chiefly to Rocky Mountain and middle western cities.

The Farmers' Mutual Creamery association of Okanogan county was organized and Tonasket designated as location of a plant which can manufacture the product of 2000 cows.

The senate has confirmed President Wilson's appointments of the following postmasters: Clarence A. Morgan at Hoquiam; Mabel Murphy at Marysville, and William F. Brown at Renton.

Representative W. E. Humphrey of Seattle, a candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator against Senator Polindexter, has sent

his declaration of candidacy to Olympia for filing.

Admissions at the state reformatory at Monroe were only 99 for the first six months of 1916, as compared with 182 for the corresponding period of 1915, said W. H. Cochran of the state board of control.

Dr. A. Royal McKeown of Leavenworth, accused of unlawfully issuing prescriptions for whiskey to laborers who engaged in a drunken brawl near Leavenworth on June 28, was acquitted before Justice Marr.

According to an arrangement made by Frank H. Lamb, chairman of the Elks parade at the state meeting in Hoquiam next month, the place of honor at the head of the procession will be given the Elks from Portland.

Elaborate preparations are under way by the Aberdeen lodge of Elks for helping the Hoquiam lodge entertain more than 2000 visitors expected on Grays Harbor August 17, 18, and 19, for the annual state reunion of Elks.

Paul Dethour, one of the most widely known Jesuit missionaries in the Pacific Northwest and for several years assistant rector of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Seattle, died after an illness of several months.

With a monster elk head attached to the head of the locomotive, and hundreds of yards of purple and white, their colors, a special train from Vancouver will bear Vancouver Elks to the annual state convention next month in Hoquiam.

Members of the Seattle police department are preparing for a threatened upheaval, following the charge of Mayor Hiram C. Gill that evidence of cowardice and failure to perform their duty on the waterfront had been lodged against the officers.

Milan R. Dump, a Spokane boy, and graduate of the old South Side high school, has become chief engineer of the Doherty syndicate, owning gas public utilities plants throughout the United States, among them the Spokane Falls Gaslight company.

Two men were shot, but not dangerously wounded, and a third was severely beaten, during a fight between 16 non-union longshoremen and strike sympathizers at the Pike Place public market in Seattle. Several other men received less serious injuries.

Three townships have been laid out on the Colville Indian reservation and will be sold by the government in parcels. The townsites are situated at Omak, Nespelem and Astor, and the lots comprising them will be offered at auction sales early in August.

The old settlers of southwest Washington are to have their reunion and picnic August 10 at Rochester, in southern Thurston county. A big feature of the day will be the picnic dinner, Governor Lister and other prominent men of the state will speak.

Pullman is promised a large manufacturing plant by "Burnett's Incorporated," an organization perfected for the purpose of manufacturing kitchen knives under a patent secured by Arthur R. Burnett of Seattle, a son-in-law of Charles E. Maynard of Colton.

May Bannard Witte, of Spokane, who claims to have discovered a process for transmuting silver into gold, with the aid of Senator Jones secured authority to conduct experiments and demonstrate her process in the laboratories in the mint bureau at Washington.

An order was placed by Lincoln county for 37,000 gallons of fuel oil with which to oil 19 miles of permanent highway. The stretch between Davenport and Harrington, a three-mile stretch east of Davenport and an equal length from Reardan west will be oiled.

Residents of Klickitat county across the river from The Dalles, Ore., are receiving liquor shipments in Oregon, according to the affidavits filed with the county clerk at The Dalles. Whether any of these residents also receive liquor in Klickitat county is not known.

The sixth annual Pacific Coast convention of the Baptist Young People's societies held its first formal meeting in Spokane at the First Baptist church. A. R. Heron of Los Angeles presided and Mayor C. A. Fleming, assisted by Miss Spokane, gave the city's address of welcome.

Although the opening day for filing declarations of candidacy to federal and state offices fell on Friday, the 13th, the ominous day had no terrors for a score of candidates for nomination, including one for governor, two for United States senator and several for congress, the first installment received containing 13 names. Only one democrat filed, this being George E. Cotterill, candidate for representative in congress for the first district, which is composed largely of Seattle.


Oil of the Porpoise. The porpoises killed in winter are the fattest and produce most oil. The largest size measure about seven feet in length, five feet in girth and weigh about 300 pounds. Such a porpoise yields from six to seven gallons of oil. The blubber of a big porpoise weighs about 100 pounds and is one and a half inches thick in summer and two in winter. The jaws of the porpoise yield a superior quality of oil. When hung up in the sun it readily drips away into cans provided for the purpose, the quantity of oil thus procured, however, being not more than half a pint to the jaw. The oil from the blubber gives an excellent light.

When Great Men Meet. Joseph Jefferson was wont to tell about meeting a modest looking man in a New York hotel who said he had seen the actor with pleasure in a performance at Washington.
