The latest despatches from the Philippines indicate an early collapse of the organized resistance to American authority in the islands.

There has been at no time during the brief period of hostilities with Aguinaldo's men, any reasonable doubt that the Filipino opposition would be dissipated quickly when the people of the islands should become convinced of the determination of the United States to control them.

It has not been a peculiarly glorious or complete victory, this breaking up of a desperate coalition of deluded islanders, stung to madness by Spanish wrongs through centuries past.

Facilitation, not punishment, is the true keynote of public sentiment and of official action as to the future attitude of the United States toward the territory swept by the flames of revolt.

With no strongly organized and well equipped force to confront our troops, the task of guerrilla hunting may well be intermitted while the Philippines commission shall take up anew the task of negotiation which was so summarily interrupted early in February last.
