Among Democrats in Congress.

WHO SHALL DIRECT MINORITY?

Bailey of Texas and Richardson of Tennessee Among the Leading Candidates.

CHICAGO, June 9.—Bally, of Texas, is coming to Chicago next week for the announced purpose of meeting the Democrats and congressmen of Illinois and adjacent states. Bally, it is believed, will announce his candidacy for the leadership of the minority in congress. Richardson, of Tenn., and Dearmond of Mo., are also candidates for the minority leadership, and are expected at the same time.

CHICAGO, June 9.—So many leading Democrats from all parts of the country are coming to the meeting of the Democratic National committee on July 20, that the gathering will probably go a long way towards determining whether it is to have its first place in the platform. A BANKER'S DAUGHTER

Who Married a Prince Is to Be Divorced.

PARIS, June 9.—When the reigning Prince of Monaco has completed his arrangements for an annuity from the funds of the Monte Carlo gambling tables, it is asserted that he will abdicate. This legal step will be followed either by a legal separation or an annulment of his marriage with the princess, daughter of the American Hebrew banker, Michael Heine, of New Orleans. One of the chief reasons leading the prince to make arrangements for abdication is the unpleasant situation created for him by the misconduct of the princess, whose infatuation for a young Hebrew composer has been a source of such public scandal that both the prince and princess were ignored by all the royal and imperial visitors in the south of France last spring.

Vein of Gas Struck.

TOWANDA, N. Y., June 9.—A big vein of gas was struck this morning in the well being drilled at South Branch, eight miles from here, at a depth of 1400 feet in the second oil sand. The gas is strong and continuous and will give much more than enough fuel to complete the drilling to depth of 1900 feet, when it is confidently expected, the third sand will be found. The Great Eastern Oil company have a lease of several thousand acres surrounding the well.

It is pointed out that Wheeler is the only man who could unite the Alabama Democrats, who are badly disrupted because of the action of Gov. Johnson in calling an extra session of the legislature and secure a repeal of the constitutional convention act after the Democratic party had made the new constitution a party issue, and had nominated delegates to the proposed convention.

BONDING ARRANGEMENTS MADE

Whereby Shipments From Seattle Will Not Be Delayed—Duties to Be Paid at Other End

FOR A DEWEY STATUE

Chicago Will Erect One in His Honor.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 9.—Admiral Dewey is to have a statue in Lincoln park, if steps taken by the park commissioners, recently, meet with the response expected. A statue in bronze second to none in the country will be ordered by the commissioners from the best sculptor that can be procured, and will be placed in one of the most prominent parts of the park. It is planned to pay over \$100,000 for the statue of the admiral.

President Woodworth proposed the idea at the park board meeting in the afternoon, and it immediately met with great favor among the commissioners. They said that if a committee could raise \$100,000 for a statue of the admiral, Chicago could get a much better one, and the only place for it would be in Lincoln park. The money is to be raised by popular subscription.

TRAIN IS WRECKED

KANSAS CITY, June 9.—A passenger train on the Pittsburg & Gulf railroad, was wrecked two miles from Grand View, 40 miles southeast of Kansas City, during last night. A smoker, chair car and one sleeper left the track and rolled over a 17 ft. embankment. The chair-car took fire, 26 passengers were injured, one fatally. Physicians and a relief train went to the scene. The injured were brought here this morning. The great number were taken last night. The cause of the accident was spreading of the rails.

FORT WORTH, Tex., June 9.—A freight train on the Texas Pacific railroad plunged through a wooden bridge at Eastland at 2:30 o'clock last night. The train was loaded with merchandise and oil. The wreck caught fire. One brakeman was killed.
