While Their Mother Worked.

WERE SHACKLED FOR WEEKS

Pathetic Story of a Factory Woman's Family in Massachusetts—A Tale of Poverty.

FALL RIVER, Mass., June 17.—Painters working near the house No. 25 Spring street yesterday saw two children chained to a box and crawling about on their hands and knees.

Before she left she said she chained up her two children and locked the chains to a padlock fitted in a dry goods box, with one side out and resembling a kennel.

Frightful Tragedy in Dawson.

The most horrible murder which has yet occurred in the Yukon Territory was committed some time between 8 and 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, May 31, when James F. Prater was killed by Arthur Goddard, of Seattle.

Prater and Goddard lived together in a house on the hill, back of Dawson. Prater was a compositor in the office of the Klondike Nugget.
