SMITH TELLS OF BAD LUCK

Predicts Much Suffering in the Northern Gold Regions.

George R. Smith, of Oakland, Cal., a recent arrival from Dawson, says that quite a number of men from the gold fields of the north, who were one of a party of four who went into the northern country a year and a half ago. None of them made anything in the Klondike, and Mr. Smith, who was the last to come out, having arrived here on the steamer Humboldt, lost every thing he possessed, and a great difficulty in getting out of the country.

"The unemployed live like dogs," said Mr. Smith to a Star reporter at the Atlantic hotel today. "Why they don't commit suicide and end their sufferings is a puzzle to me. I am confident that there are fully 4000 men in the country who are actually starving."
