It has been believed by many that the Great Northern would be willing to join in an arrangement to erect such a depot here, but the authoritative statement was lacking. President Hill has seen fit to make it through The Star. Now that the presidents of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern fully understand each other's position, there is no doubt but what the union depot arrangements will be pushed with all possible despatch. A magnificent structure will undoubtedly be erected, which will be a credit to the railroads and an ornament to the city. Seattle has reason to congratulate herself upon winning two magnificent commercial victories during the past year. She has succeeded in convincing the United States Government of the superior advantages of this port, as compared to San Francisco, for outfitting transports destined for the Philippines. Now she has the happy privilege of seeing all transcontinental lines seeking for her trade, and finally agreed upon making suitable provision to take care of the mighty and ever increasing volume of traffic.

ADDRESS TO MINING MEN

Delivered Today by Senator Teller of Colorado.
 Hon. Henry M. Teller, United States senator from Colorado, spoke before the mining men of the city today at 2 o'clock in the chambers of the Seattle Mining Exchange. In a few brief, but well expressed remarks, the senator reviewed the benefits of the mining industry to humanity. He compared the condition of the country before the discoveries of '48 and of the present day, logically showing the influence of the producers of precious metals on the present prosperity.

STEVE LYTS HITS HIS ENEMIES

Steve Lyts has at last had an opportunity to get back to his old-time friends, John B. Hart and James F. Wilson. On an affidavit signed by him, Judge Jacobs this morning again issued an order for the above-named parties to show cause why they should not be punished for contempt, and, in addition, John B. Hart is to show cause why he should not be imprisoned or suspended from practice. While Assistant Attorney General Vance was in Seattle yesterday, he prepared an affidavit for Lyts to sign, giving a history of the case from the time of his arrest up to the present. Today this was presented to Lyts and he made affidavit as to the truth of the statements contained therein. When this was presented to Judge Jacobs he signed a rule of court for John B. Hart and James F. Wilson to appear and show cause why they should not be punished for contempt, and L. C. Gilman will appear for the defense, and Assistant Attorney General Vance for the state. In all probability an interesting legal battle will develop out of this case before it is settled.

SMELTER SITE IN SEATTLE

Will be Chosen in Preference to Other Sites Offered.
 Dr. Adams, who is associated with Edward W. Drew, the Chicago millionaire, endeavoring to find a location for a smelter, said to a Star reporter today: "We have been offered many sites. One is in Tacoma, near the present smelter, and another is at Everett, where we are offered 80 acres of land and \$25,000 subsidy. We have decided not to take either of these sites, as Everett is practically owned by Rockefeller, and Tacoma's business inducements are very limited. You can state authoritatively that this smelter will be located in Seattle. This is the only city that is suited to our demands. We are offered a site at Smith's Cove, and another at Salmon bay, near Ballard. We have not selected either of these, but will find some place here to locate. We have chosen Seattle because of its railroad and wharf facilities. We must be near deep water in order to handle economically the output of our own mines in Alaska and Vancouver island. We are great producers of copper right here in King county, and as our mines are not half developed, there is no telling what their value is. At our Plymouth group in the Index district, near Miller river, we have recently struck a 25-foot ledge of boninite copper, that gets better the deeper we go down. We have nine men at work on it, and have sent samples of the ore to the assayer. We are putting in a concentrating plant there now, and will soon be able to smelt our own ore."

Sunk a Yacht.

BELFAST, Aug. 1.—The steamer Dromedary, in a fog last night, collided with a yacht, which sunk with all hands on board.

Famine in Pig Iron.

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 1.—A pig iron famine has come. The brokers in this city say the dealers are not trying to sell iron for shipment before January 1 next, and none is to be had for shipment sooner than the first of September.

BARTENDER JAILED.

George Hildebrand, night bartender in the Big Bonanza saloon, was arrested about 8:30 o'clock last night on a warrant charging him with grand larceny. It is alleged Hildebrand is an accomplice of Lily Everett, who is accused of robbing Frank Zipman, a Klondiker, of \$280, in a box in the Big Bonanza saloon Sunday night.

THE DIRIGO AT NANAIMO

NANAIMO, B. C., Aug. 1.—The steamer Dirigo has arrived here with 100 passengers on board, most of whom are from the interior. Purser McClinton states that he has at least \$100,000 in treasure on board. The steamer ought to reach Seattle by 8 o'clock tonight.

Panic in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.—The bank crisis precipitated what practically amounts to a panic on the stock exchange. Stocks are being thrown on the market in large lots, and prices have fallen considerably.

Dewey in Italy.

TRIESTE, Aug. 1.—The United States cruiser Olympia, with Dewey aboard, sailed for Naples this afternoon. He expects to arrive at the Italian port on Friday.

IMPROMPTU PRIZE FIGHT OCCURS AT BATTLE CREEK

Two Policemen Engage Kid Lavigne in Contest Without Gloves--Kid Knocked Out.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Aug. 1.—This morning an officer with 12 recruits for the Thirtieth regiment, passed through here en route to Chicago. Among the number was Kid Lavigne, the pugilist. He got off at the station here well filled with whisky and insulted a policeman. The latter knocked him down with his fist, and gave him a severe licking. Lavigne then drew a revolver on another policeman, who knocked him down with a club, and then put on some finishing touches. The officers did not arrest Lavigne.

"P-I" MUST DEFEND ITSELF AGAINST CRIMINAL CHARGES

According to a decision rendered by Assistant Attorney General Vance today, action should be taken by Judge Jacobs against the Post-Intelligencer for the publication in its columns of certain matter reflecting upon the judge during the progress of the Hart-Wilson contempt proceedings. No date is fixed for the action to be taken against the publishers of the paper in question, but it is understood that there will be no unnecessary delay. In a general way, the cases of Baker and Tugwell, of the Tacoma Sun, will be taken as a precedent. These two men were found guilty of contempt of court and slander of judges, and were sentenced to 100 days in jail. They were pardoned by the governor before they had served their sentence. It will be recalled that Judge Jacobs told the Star in an interview that he proposed to proceed against the "P-I." and that paper, quoting the Star's interview editorially challenged the judge to go ahead, and it would welcome the fight and pay all of his legal expenses. It is quite evident that the judge has accepted the challenge in earnest and is going to proceed to extremities.
