MINING NEWS.

At the Iron Mask (Roseland) the output is now 250 tons per week.

At the St. Anthony, in the Fish Lake district, a highly mineralized quartz vein 12 feet wide has been struck on the 55 foot level.

Milwaukee capitalists have started out prospecting to make a thorough study of the St. Helen's mining district.

At the Hit or Miss (Republic) the work has been stopped until the whim has arrived.

The Princess Maude's new compressor is at the depot but cannot be taken to the mine just yet on account of the bad roads.

At the Copher, near Republic, the shaft is being sunk at the rate of three feet per day.

The Republic Consolidated paid its twelfth dividend on the 15th of this month.

The annual pay rates of the mines located near Roseland, all told, add up to \$1,680,000 at the present time.

The total output of ore at Roseland for the year amounts to 153,668 tons.
