DAWSON, N. W. T., Feb. 18.—The mass meeting that was held here addressed a set of resolutions to parliament at Ottawa in which they denounced the additional concessions to the "Treadgold syndicate" as unjust, detrimental to development and injurious to mining in the entire district.

TO HAVE A HOUSE

Fisher Family at Green Lake to Be Given Habitation

Humane Officer Ridgway today made arrangements for the purchase of lumber to build a house for the destitute family of Geo. A. Fisher at Green Lake. The lumber was purchased in Ballard with money donated by charitable persons and the home will be built with donated labor.

Several carpenters have signified their willingness to take a hand and build the house. Mr. Ridgway will take wages this evening and collect the clothing donated by citizens.

Yesterday Mr. Fisher brought his family into the city, and with Humane Officer Ridgway went to Dr. Carroll's office, where they were vaccinated by Dr. Carroll and the mother released from the care of them during the day. Yesterday numbers of people went out to see the family and quantities of clothes were left with the Fishers.

Geo. Fisher senior now has a position on the section crew and will soon get on his feet. The estimate for the lumber for the house was today made up by D. N. Foy. The house will be 14 by 20 feet and will contain two rooms and an attic. Carpenters wishing to contribute their labor will be on the ground tomorrow morning.

Humane Officer Ridgway wishes to say that the offer of the Blagos had not materialized, and there must have been some mistake in the regard. There is money enough in hand in the hands of the officer to build the house.

The \$5 left at the Star office has been turned over to Officer Ridgway for use on the house. There is now enough clothing on hand.

NOME RATES

A meeting of representatives of the local steamship lines was held in the office of the Arlington dock late yesterday afternoon, for the purpose of reaching an agreement on Nome rates for the coming season. The companies were nearly all represented. A discussion of the proposed card occurred, and the views pro and con were exchanged. It was the unanimous sense of the meeting that last year's rate, both passenger and freight, should prevail all the year. Another meeting will be held in about a week, when definite action toward establishing a rate card for Nome rates will be taken.

RECOVER 800

ODESSA, Feb. 18.—The work of recovering bodies of the victims of the Shamaka earthquake continues. Over 800 bodies have thus far been taken from the ruins. The government is now active in giving aid and shelter, and a city of tents has arisen on the hillside overlooking the scene of the disaster.

MAULAY DEFAULTS

Seattle Man Who Figures in Farnsworth Unhappiness

The Seattle police are scouring the city in search of Angus McAulay, the local real estate man charged with adultery by A. H. Farnsworth. When McAulay was arrested several days ago in the Grand opera house, he was put under \$1000 bonds, and for some time stayed in the city jail. After spending one night and a day in jail he was released by Justice Cann on \$200 bail. This, according to officers of the prosecuting attorney's office, was done without the sanction of that office.

Now Prosecuting Attorney Fulton has requested Justice Cann to raise the bail to \$1000 again, and to issue a bench warrant for McAulay's arrest. McAulay cannot be found. His trial comes up tomorrow and he is now in default.

PUGET SOUND STANDS FIRST

An interesting comparison relating to the amount of commerce done by Puget sound, the Columbia river and San Francisco, the three most important districts on the Pacific coast, is made in the monthly summary of commerce and finance of the United States for December of last year. This report is compiled under the direction of the bureau of statistics of the treasury department. A copy of the summary has been received at the chamber of commerce.

The net tonnage of vessels entering Puget sound was 116,624 tons; San Francisco, 129,878, and Columbia river, 119,203 tons. The clearances were as follows: Puget sound, 124,616 tons; San Francisco, 128,621 tons, and Columbia river, 29,858 tons. The figures show that Puget sound exceeds San Francisco in the arrivals and is but little behind the California metropolis in the clearings.

WILL SELL BEEF

Nearly 200 employees of the Seattle postoffice have formed themselves into a company, the purpose of which is to go into the cattle raising business. They have a large ranch and range in Eastern Washington, and will there raise beef for the Alaska trade. Assistant Postmaster Collette is at the head of the venture.

PROTEST

A protest signed by over 50 residents of Seattle against the establishment of the proposed city hospital at Fifth avenue and Yesler way was filed with the city clerk this afternoon. The reasons given for objecting to the hospital are that it would be in the city property in the locality, that the location is too public, and in cases of contagious disease its presence would be a menace to the health of the city.

FIVE CROOKS APPREHENDED

Police Make a Haul Which They Believe Important

Five men whom the police believe to be responsible for the greater part of the thieving and hold-up work in this city of late, were arrested by Detectives Hubbard and Freeman and Patrolman Kelly last night. In the room of the new hotel, at Sixth avenue and Pike street, the men were found. Four of them are notorious criminals who have served time in the penitentiary. William Harrison, his brother, H. Harrison, alias "Whitey," alias the "Spokane razor," and a brother, J. Harrison, alias O'Brien; Harry Roberts, alias Lloyd, and J. McGraw, are the names given by the prisoners. Well dressed, they showed every evidence of having lived in ease for some time.

A .41 calibre Colt's revolver, a slung shot and a leather blackbag were found in the room occupied by the men. The revolver was between the two mattresses of the bed. In an expensive hand satchel was found a fur collar, a black silk waist, a dozen new neckties and several pairs of ladies' stockings. Three umbrellas and a new razor were also found.
