

EXTRA EDITION TRACY SHOTS DOWN SEVERAL PURSUERS

The sheriff's posse, composed of Jack Williams, Deputy Sheriff Nelson, Raymond and Bower, two officers of Everett; Carl Anderson, a reporter of the Star and Louie B. Seifrit, a reporter of the Times, came upon convict Tracy at a cabin on the banks of the Squak slough, two miles this side of Bothel, at 10 minutes of 3 this afternoon. A terrible battle ensued. Raymond and Seifrit were shot and are lying in the ditch besides the railroad track probably dead. Deputy Sheriff Williams was shot under the heart and in the

right hand, and was driven to Bothel by Carl Anderson in a rig belonging to the Everett officers. Anderson miraculously escaped, but shot three times at Tracy from behind a stump. Tracy being in plain view. It is not known whether he was hit. Nelson and Bower are still on the scene. Every available man from Bothel is rushing toward the cabin.

ly ordered him to stop the hila. he marched the remaining four down to the beach and aboard the gasoline launch N. & S., which was lying at the wharf. He said he wished to be taken to Tacoma and assisted his unwilling companions to start the launch under way, keeping them constantly covered with his rifle, however.

MADE HIMSELF AGREEABLE The launch left South bay at 10 o'clock in the morning. The trip was without special incident, Capt. Clark says. Tracy made himself an agreeable traveling companion and, barring an uncomfortable habit of pointing his rifle at his crew, made himself a good fellow.

He told blood-curdling stories of his past life and his adventures since breaking prison. His most startling story was that three days before he had murdered his companion in crime Merrill, in cold blood. Merrill, he said, had not acted right and deserved his fate. Clark said Tracy also wanted to be taken past McNeil island penitentiary in order that he might shoot a guard or two from the launch. He also wanted to shoot the captain of the Tug Seafarer, which approached near the launch. Capt. Clark talked him out of the notion.

AT LONELY MEADOW POINT When opposite Tacoma Tracy changed his mind regarding his destination and asked to be taken to Interbay or some other point between Seattle and Ballard. At Interbay, however, he changed his mind again and asked to be set ashore at Meadow point, three miles north of Ballard.

The launch passed the entrance of Seattle harbor in broad daylight, between 5 and 6 o'clock yesterday evening. A landing was made at Meadow point about an hour later. Here Tracy compelled Scott to tie his three companions hand and foot. Tracy bade them good-by and promised to pay them well some time for the use of the launch, and for their services. Then Tracy ordered Scott to leave the launch and go with him to Ballard. They walked together down the railroad track toward the town, Scott, by Tracy's order, going slightly in advance. Tracy talked freely of his plans. He said he intended to hold up the first policeman he met and take his revolver away from him. Then he was going to make his way into Seattle by a roundabout way, hold up Clancy's saloon and gambling house and escape by the aid of friends he had in the city.

Tracy parted with Scott near Ballard, telling him that he need come no further. Scott at once hastened back to Meadow point without stopping to give the alarm in Ballard. On arriving at the launch he found that his companions had already released themselves, and all four come on into this city, where Clark laid the facts before the police. His story was corroborated by the other men of the party.

SAFETY OF THE PORTLAND AND JEANIE IN DOUBT

The fate of the steamships Portland and Jeanie is still unknown according to information brought down on the Senator, which arrived at Port Townsend last night. Captain Patterson of the Senator says there is no truth in the report made by the Centennial on that vessel's arrival Monday, that the overdue Portland and Jeanie had been found imprisoned in the ice off Cape Prince of Wales. Captain Patterson states that the revenue cutter Theta had returned to Nome to replenish her coal supply three days prior to June 24, the date the Senator sailed, and at that time no word whatever had been heard from the vessels, nor had the Theta even sighted them. The revenue cutter, however, was preparing to resume her searching cruise. The Senator sailed from Nome four days after the arrival of the whaler Bevidere with the news alleged to have been given to the Centennial. The steamship Et. Paul, which arrived yesterday at San Francisco and left Nome two days after the Centennial, corroborates the report of the Senator.

TRANS GO TOGETHER

24 Persons Injured by Operator's Error PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 3.—In a collision on the Pittsburgh and Western railway this morning more than a score of persons were more or less injured. Four persons were seriously hurt, but it is believed none will die. Twenty others sustained wounds, bruises and broken limbs. The accident was caused by a misunderstanding of the train dispatcher and a telegraph operator, by which train 4 ran into the rear end of the Butler accommodation. The engine telegraphed the rear coach of the accommodation in which there were 52 passengers and rode up on top of a freight car ahead before stopping. The engineer and fireman both jumped and saved themselves. A special train, was sent from Pittsburgh near where the accident took place and the injured were all cared for on the scene. The road is at this time installing a new block system.

WATCHING CITY PARK

Certain Girls of Ballard Must Be Cared for BALLARD, July 3.—Several young girls ranging from 12 to 15 years of age have for the last few nights made City park their rendezvous. Marshal Hunt has notified his officers to carefully watch the park and arrest all violators of the curfew law. Since the exposure of young girls and soldiers in all night carousals at Fort Lawton three weeks ago, citizens of Ballard have been up in arms. It is now said that several of these girls consort with hoodlums at City park. This is the reason Marshal Hunt is so active watching the place. The Ballard News has changed hands. Dowd & Woody have sold their plant to the Huffner Brothers. The latter are experienced newspapermen, lately from Indiana.

ARMORY BALL

Tomorrow's celebration will close with a grand ball at the Armory under the auspices of the Western Central Labor Union. Wagner's First Regiment orchestra has been engaged and elaborate preparations made for the occasion. The committee promises it to be the largest attended affair of the kind this season, and a great number of tickets having already been sold.

ON THE MURDERER'S TRAIL

The posse which is now scouring the woods near Ravenna park for the convict Tracy is headed by Sheriff Jack Williams, and is composed of Deputy Sheriffs L. W. Nelson and H. J. McGee, and two newspaper men. Each man is heavily armed. They went by launch from Madison street park to Ravenna park, and there disembarked and started north along the east road. Sheriff Cudihee, who is at Issaquah on other business, has been notified of Tracy's presence in King county and will probably organize a posse there and work down toward Lake Washington. Sheriff Zimmerman of Snohomish county, has been notified by the sheriff's office, of the Oregon convict's northern progress, and will probably organize a posse to aid Sheriff Cudihee. A telephone message from Bothel to the sheriff's office announces that the marshal of that place has organized a posse to help hunt the convict. The police are closely guarding all roads leading into the city from the northward, also watching all car lines to Lake Washington.

Harry Tracy, the blood-thirsty and elusive Oregon prison-breaker and murderer is alleged to be in or about Seattle. It has been reported to the police that the escaped convict arrived from Olympia last night in an impressed gasoline launch and landed near Meadow point, three miles north of Ballard, from which spot he headed toward Seattle.

Sheriff Cudihee now has in the field a posse of five men searching for the desperado. They started under the leadership of Deputy Jack Williams at 8:30 o'clock this morning. Prior to this, two deputies were sent to Meadow point and are scouring the shores and woods that skirt the shores of Shilshole bay. The local police department was even quicker to begin the man hunt. At midnight three city detectives went to Ballard and began working on the case.

TRACY SEEN THIS MORNING The latest information is that Tracy passed through Ballard, Fremont and Latona shortly after daylight this morning and is now headed for the Canadian boundary line by way of the Seattle & International railroad. John Freeman at 8 o'clock this morning reported to the sheriff's office that he had seen Tracy near Ravenna park at about 6:30 o'clock. The man was armed with a rifle and was carrying a large bundle. He was walking north along the Seattle & International track, and Freeman claims that he positively recognized him as Tracy by his resemblance to the published photographs of the latter.

Freeman says he was but 50 feet from the man when the latter passed. The supposed convict paid no attention to him further than to quicken his pace slightly. The sheriff's office is much impressed with Freeman's story, and the posse is now working north from Ravenna park.

REPORTED TO THE POLICE The report of Tracy's arrival in Seattle was made to the police at 10:30 o'clock last night by Capt. A. J. Clark of Olympia, the owner of the gasoline launch N. & S. Clark's is a thrilling narrative. He says that Tracy appeared at the fishing camp of the Capital City Oyster Co. at South point, near Olympia, yesterday morning about 6:30 o'clock. He ordered breakfast and ate at the same table with the fishing crew, of which Capt. Clark was a member. During the meal he seemed nervous and sat with his 30-30 Winchester rifle across his knees. After the meal was finished he coolly informed the men of the fishing crew that he was Tracy, the escaped convict. There were in the room at the time, Capt. Clark, his son, Edwin Clark, 15 years of age; J. Munro, Frank Scott, Horatio Alling and William Adair, the last-named being the camp cook. They were inclined to ridicule the man's statement, but were soon brought to their senses. The stranger covered Capt. Clark with his rifle and sharp-

PRESIDENT TO MAKE FILIPINOS FREE MEN

Will Grant Amnesty To Aguinaldo, Del Pilar and All Other Insurgents

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—President Roosevelt's contribution to the celebration of the Nation's independence will take the form of carrying out the traditions of freedom, although the Filipinos will be the ones who will directly benefit. Over his signature there will issue tomorrow a sweeping declaration declaring hostilities ended in the Philippines with the single exception of the islands occupied by the Moros. It marks the end of military rule in the islands. The office of military governor is abolished and General Chaffee's position will be that of department commander of the United States Army, subject, as in the United States, to the call of the civil authorities. One of the features of the proclamation will be the amnesty clause whereby many of the old insurgent leaders can again go as they please and assume all the rights of American citizenship in the islands. It will release from custody Aguinaldo, Del Pilar and Mabini. Those who are opposed to the latter action predict that it will be but a short time before Aguinaldo will again stir up active warfare and rebellion. Del Pilar will doubtless remain passive. Acting Governor Wright called Secretary Root this morning as follows: The provincial government was inaugurated at Laguna on July 1, thus completing the establishment of a civil government over all the islands.
