LABOR WINS BIG VICTORY

Omaha Judge Issues a Sweeping Injunction Against Employers

OMAHA, Neb., May 12.—Judge Johnston of the district court last night issued an injunction directed against the Business Men's Association and the proprietors of about 50 business concerns affected by the present strike. It is probably the most sweeping injunction of the kind ever issued and is looked upon as a landmark in the history of labor law.
