

CITY WILL BE WELL POLICED

Chief Sullivan Has Plans Well Under Way for Protecting the President

Chief of Police Sullivan has practically arranged his program for policing Seattle during the visit of President Roosevelt. While the president is here the local force of militia, in company with Colonel Lamping, will act in conjunction with the police officers in the work of keeping order and protecting the president and his party, and the crowd of sightseers. Captain Ward will probably have almost complete charge of the police end of the arrangements. During the past few weeks he has been drilling the three police patrols regularly until the patrolmen are almost as well drilled as a regular military company. The feature of the police department's work will be the presence of uniformed mounted patrolmen who will act as the personal escort of the president while he is in the city. The 10 men will be selected from the regular police force. Every plain clothes man employed by the local police will be on duty extra hours to mingle in the crowds that will surround the president and his party.
