LAW AGAINST LOTTERIES IS AS PLAIN AS DAY

Chief Sullivan Hasn't a Leg to Stand on in His Refusal to Close Up Philanthropist Ferguson's Notorious Joint

THE LAW AGAINST LOTTERIES

ORDINANCE No. 5657, Approved Nov. 17, 1890, Sec. 32.—Whoever shall maintain or run, or be in any manner connected with, any lottery or any establishment or business, by whatever name it may be known, wherein any property is sold or disposed of by chance, or whoever shall, within the city, sell or dispose of any lottery ticket or share, either for religious or secular purposes, or any chance, or any article or thing entitling or purporting to entitle, the purchaser, by any chance, or whoever shall, within the city, sell or dispose of any package or article containing a prize, or where, as an inducement to purchase, it is held out that such article or package may contain a prize or may entitle the purchaser to some article or thing of value, not directly contemplated and known in the thing of value, on conviction, be fined not more than One Hundred Dollars for each offense, or imprisoned not exceeding thirty days, or both.

Tomorrow the trial of Chief of Police Sullivan on the grand jury indictment charging him with failure to do his duty as a public officer will be commenced before Superior Judge Bell. The charge, in substance, is that the chief violated the law by failing to close the big gambling houses which bring the greater part of his administration into disrepute in Seattle.

DRINKING RESORT NEAR NAVY YARD

Proposition on Foot to Erect a Big Road House Just Outside the Limits of the Town of Bremerton

BREMERTON, Wn., June 12.—A first prior of the Bremerton town council, situated on the public highway just outside the town limits, but not so far from the gates of the navy yard that the men employed there cannot winkle at Ferguson's game, which is run openly and above board within half a dozen blocks of his office.

ENJOINED

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KING AND QUEEN BURIED IN A PIT

Servian Populace Indulge in Post Mortem Indignities in Disposing of the Remains of the Murdered Monarchs

LONDON, June 12.—The Evening Star's Belgrade correspondent writes: "The bodies of King Alexander and Queen Draga were buried in a pit early this morning at Rakonitz. As a mark of indignity the bodies of the royal couple's relatives and those of the murdered statesmen, were thrown in on top of them and the earth filled in."

BEGRAD, Servia, June 12.—The first trouble under the new regime is reported from Nisich this morning. It is stated that the entire garrison there has refused to obey the mandates of the new ministry.

BEGRAD, June 12.—The bodies of all those killed yesterday morning with the exception of that of King Alexander, will be buried tonight. The king's body has been claimed by ex-Queen Natalie and after the inquest will have a burial at the Rakonitz monastery.

BEGRAD, June 12.—The bodies of King Alexander and Queen Draga were buried secretly in the old cemetery of St. Marg between 1:30 and 3 o'clock this morning.

VIENNA, June 12.—The Neu Press this morning states: "Neither the sister nor the nephews of Queen Draga were killed at Belgrade yesterday. Besides Queen Draga the only members of her family who were murdered were her two brothers."

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 12.—Secretary of Legation Wilson at Athens, sent the following cablegram to the state department last night from Athens: "No new Servian king has been officially proclaimed. The National Assembly will decide Monday."

LONDON, June 12.—A dispatch from Belgrade this afternoon says that 100 were killed in the revolution. The bodies of the king and queen were buried in an old cemetery secretly to avoid a demonstration. Both bodies were dissected. Draga's sisters are both alive.

Business was resumed in normal fashion today. Soldiers are being liberally treated to drinks. Thousands of spectators have visited the cemetery where the royal couple are interred. The cemetery is filled with soldiers on guard.
