

ASIDE TOWARD GREATER SEATTLE

Chamber of Commerce Is Investigating the Question of Annexing Five Prosperous Suburbs

At a meeting of the special Chamber of Commerce committee, appointed to investigate the matter of annexation of Seattle's suburbs to the city proper, it was decided yesterday afternoon to push the annexation proposition in view of securing an expression in the near future from the people in each of the suburbs it is proposed to annex.

The legal phase of the question was considered at length and it was found that one-fifth of the voters in the last regular election might procure an election to decide for or against annexation in the suburb affected on presenting a petition for an election in the usual manner.

Joseph Shippen, who has made a special investigation in regard to annexation in Ballard, Georgetown, South Park, South Seattle and West Seattle, reported that the public opinion in each of the places almost unanimously in favor of annexation, but that the politicians and officials who reap a personal benefit from the local city and town governments are opposed to it and will fight it to the bitter end.

HARD TO EXPLAIN

HO W MAYER PULLED THE WOOL OVER CITY DADS' EYES

Some members of the city council may have considerable trouble in explaining how they were so easily duped in allowing John E. B. Mayer \$2000 damages, 13 months ago, for a broken knee-cap alleged to have been sustained in a fall on Fourth avenue, near Benca street.

Mayer is now in jail at Astoria, Ore., on a charge of perjury committed in trying to collect damages from that city for the same injury alleged to have been sustained by the old council had 14 months ago, tending to prove that the broken knee-cap was not sustained either in Seattle or in Astoria, or in several other places where Mayer, who has several aliases, has tried to collect damages for it, but in none more prior to his appearance in this city.

There are several peculiar circumstances surrounding the payment of the claim that are unexplained. The old council proceeding, adopted the committee report signed by Hyatt James and Taylor recommending that the claim be shelved, and that Mayer be forced to get judgment in his suit in Seattle. As a matter of fact the claim committee, of which James and Taylor were still members, settled the claim for \$2000.

Dr. Limerick of the board of health examined Mayer's knee and made affidavit that he was permanently injured at the time the claim was filed, and Dr. Crichton, a member of the council, later examined the injury and also reported that Mayer was a permanent nature.

John B. Hart and P. D. Hughes were Mayer's attorneys.

FORMAL OPENING THIS EVENING

Royal Restaurant Enlarged and Elegantly Refurnished

The Royal Restaurant, at 815 First avenue, upon which thousands of dollars have been expended, re-furnishing, enlarging and decorating, will be formally opened to the public at the regular dinner hour this evening.

The whole interior of the building has practically been rebuilt, and old patrons will scarcely recognize the place as being the old "Royal." The main dining room and the annex, which have recently been redecorated and re-furnished, are by far the handsomest in the city. Perhaps the most pleasing feature of the new Royal, especially from the feminine point of view, is the second floor, which has been transformed into a series of elaborately furnished private dining rooms, representing the American, Turkish, Dutch, German and English.

Besides these there are a number of smaller dining rooms, which can be thrown into one large banquet parlor. The third floor will also be added to the Royal in a few weeks for use as a private ballroom and banquet hall for the accommodation of parties and receptions, to which the management will cater to the best of their power.

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
