HAPPENINGS ABOUT TOWN



Queen Anne hill came in for a great deal of attention from the city council last night. Among other things, an ordinance compelling the Seattle Electric company to give a six-minute service to the top of Queen Anne hill was introduced by mistake. The Queen Anne Improvement club at its last meeting, it might be explained, decided to urge upon the street committee the improvement of the car service by hurrying the completion of the survey and grading that is at present interfering with it. UNCLE SAM'S SHIPS RUSHED TO PANAMA



The United States cruiser Nashville is now at Panama. The Dixie was ordered to proceed there as soon as Washington heard of the revolution. Admiral Glass in command of the Pacific squadron is at Aspinwall with the Marblehead, Wyoming and Concord, awaiting orders to proceed to Colon.

ACQUITTED

L. E. Murphy, a non-union street car man charged with assaulting F. W. Speir, a striker, last April, was tried in the superior court yesterday before Judge Miller and acquitted. Murphy alleged, and was corroborated in his testimony, that he acted only in self defense when he struck Speir over the head with a club.

BECK GAVE THE BOND PEDESTRIAN HAD A NARROW ESCAPE

Peter Ayde, proprietor of the St. Paul Store Repair and Plumbing company, had a narrow escape in connection with the Second avenue and Madison street runaway yesterday morning. He was crossing Madison street at the time, and in rushing to escape the team, fell on the pavement.

KNOWN HERE

Frank Westfall, who is under arrest in San Francisco charged with embezzling money from S. H. McKee, a Tacoma butcher, is well known in Seattle. At the time of the butcher's strike against the Frye-Bruhn company, he was one of the officers of the union and a leader in the strike. He has been known among labor union men in the Northwest, and is especially well known here. He will be brought to Tacoma for trial.

BIG RUSH FOR CHIPPEWA LANDS

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 10.—Nearly 50,000 acres of land in the Chippewa Indian reservation in the northern part of this state are thrown open to settlement today, and as a result there is a small-sized Cherokee Strip opening. The tract constitutes a part of the Chippewa lands segregated as the result of an examination by land experts from the timber lands. While there is considerable swamp land in the tract, the greater part of it is arable, and as a consequence there has been a great rush of farmers and other prospective settlers.
