## HE CAN'T SLEEP

### JUDGE HUMPHRIES WANTS A REVOLVING ELECTRIC SIGN ABATED AS A NUISANCE

John E. Humphries, the lawyer, is greatly disturbed by the revolving electric light in front of the Empire theater, on First avenue between Marion and Madison streets, and for that reason the gubernatorial candidate, in a communication to the board of public works this morning, asks the immediate revocation of the permit which allows the wheel to run, if there is such a permit.

Mr. Humphries states that he held a torch in the Palace hotel, immediately over the theater, before the latter came into existence, and that against his will and without his consent the owners of the theater put into operation the wheel, which makes a noise like "planing mill." Mr. Humphries declares the thing to be a nuisance and says that his wife's nerves cannot endure it and that he, also, is greatly annoyed by it.

## WONDER OF WONDERS

The Seattle Electric Company this morning broke all records by asking permission from the board of public works to lay temporary tracks on Queen Anne avenue for the benefit of its patrons. It may have been the ordinance which Dr. Crichton introduced at the last meeting of the council "by mistake," which, if passed, would compel the monopoly to maintain a six-minute service to the top of Queen Anne hill that brought about the unheard-of action of the electric company.

The company desires to lay temporary tracks on the freshly-laid concrete on Queen Anne avenue from Lee to Galer street. For nearly a month the track on this block has been ripped up so that a sewer could be dug there. Unfortunately there was no sewer pipe to be had and since the track has been removed no work has been done. Accordingly passengers have been obliged to transfer and walk at this point, as they do further south on Queen Anne avenue.

Franchise Inspector Wheeler gave his permission to lay the track provided the asphalt paving company does not object.

## ETHEL GROUP SOLD

SEATTLE MAN BUYS MINES NEAR SILVER LAKE, IN THE MONTE CRISTO DISTRICT

(Special to The Star) EVERETT, Nov. 12.—The Ethel group of three mining claims near Silver Lake in the Monte Cristo district has been sold by Captain Christie, L. Hillhouse and Jacob Cohen to H. H. Dearborn, a Seattle capitalist.

The exact consideration is not made public. Last summer the owners refused \$6,000 cash for the property, their price being \$10,000. Last spring they bought the property of M. T. J. Collins, "the duke of Monte Cristo," for \$300.


