ALEUTS FOR ST. LOUIS

Sixteen natives of the Aleutian Islands, en route to the St. Louis exposition, arrived in Seattle last night. They are in charge of L. L. Bales, an Alaskan trader and trapper, and were brought down on the steamer Excelsior. The Aleuts are of the sea otter hunting tribes and there are four children in the party. Among the other hunters is Ah Pak, who has a record of 286 otter skins. His hands are badly scarred and disfigured from the bites of the animals he has caught.

These are the first natives of the Aleutians that have ever been out of their own country and they are expected to arouse much interest at the big fair.

WONT USE CHUCKANUT

The council in special session last night refused to appropriate \$5,000 to pay the cost of substituting Chuckanut for Tenino stone in the Carnegie library building. M. J. Carkeek, who headed the petitioners who asked for the money, was placed on the rack, and despite the protection of Councilman Critchton was subjected to a cross examination in which he failed to make good. The proposition lost by a vote of 8 to 4. Mr. Carkeek virtually admitted that the library plan was deficient in many respects, and that perhaps \$50,000 more would have to be used to finish the building properly. Bowen led the fight against granting the appropriation. He said he did not like the manner in which it was being attempted to rush the project through.

STRAWBERRIES FOR DAWSON

With the first strawberry shipment for Dawson this year the Alaska Steamship company's steamer Dolphin sailed for the North last night. The vessel carried 50 crates of the berries, which were shipped in by J. A. Anderson, of Dawson, and will be the first strawberries to be placed on the Dawson market this year.

The Dolphin also carried 50 head of cattle, which are to be taken in to Fairbanks. The Dolphin took 100 passengers, the majority of whom were bound for Dawson.

She found him in the cafe with another woman and threw the bottle of vitriol at the couple. The bottle broke and scattered the fluid about the room, painfully burning a score of other people.

LAYING IRON

Good Progress Being Made on Seattle-Everett Road

Work of laying rails on the inter-urban electric line from Seattle to Everett was begun this morning. The company has been delayed in this work for some time owing to the inability to get rails delivered promptly at Ballard, but Monday a large lot was taken to the end of the line, and now the men are putting them in place. About three-quarters of a mile of the road bed is ready and it is expected that by the last of the week nearly a mile will be laid with rails. Fred E. Blander, promoter of the road, said this morning that the company would have the Ballard part of the road done long before the time limit expired, as the work was going on much faster than was expected.

It is now thought that in three weeks more the line will be built through Ballard and work on the cross country section to Everett will begin. The distance across the city of Ballard is only about three miles, and the work is comparatively easy on account of there being no excavation work.

Chamber of Commerce

The Chamber of Commerce committee on city affairs held a meeting at 2 o'clock this afternoon just previous to the general meeting of the chamber and talked over the waterway project. On account of the recent action of the city council there was little left for the committee to do. At the general meeting, at 4 o'clock, several committees will report, among them being the one appointed to visit Vashon island.


