

# WILL GET MORE CARS

### CONTRACTOR ERICKSON PROPOSES TO DOUBLE CARRYING CAPACITY FROM SECOND AVENUE

Contractor C. J. Erickson is fitting up purchasing 30 more cars in order to proceed the regrade of Second avenue with more speed. This will give him just twice as many as he now has. Lack of funds is said to be hampering his plans, but he is going to make an attempt to get the additional cars if possible. The contractor has not yet received a single cent for the work he has already done on the big job. The city council has been withholding the approval of the assessment rolls because it has been somewhat undecided about allowing Erickson an extension of time so that he can proceed with the work.

Although Erickson has begun to sluice at Blanchard street it is not believed by city officials that he is yet making the excavations as rapidly as he should. He has 30 cars, but four of them are generally under present conditions he is not hoping to remove more than 40,000 yards of earth next month by means of his steam shovels and cars.

Not more than 1,000 yards are being removed every night, although with the present number of cars the work is being done as fast as possible by operating only at night. Yet there are 600,000 yards of earth in Second avenue and adjacent streets yet to be removed and three times that amount from private property. At the present rate of progress, therefore, it will take from three to five years to finish the big undertaking.

It is evident to those who have been watching the work that it will have to be prosecuted with more dispatch. Mayor Ballinger and the board of works have authority to complete the work themselves, but they are loath to tackle the big proposition. So they and the property owners affected are beseeching Erickson to hurry and the latter is struggling with the difficulties of the proposition and lack of funds. Thirty more cars will help him out considerably.

# LITTLE TALES TERSELY TOLD

THE STUBBLEFIELD home for indigent widows and orphans, at Walla Walla, will be opened early in October. The home was established by the terms of the will of the late Joseph Stubblefield, an aged farmer, who died about two years ago.

CARRIE FOLMER, a child 14 years old, who has been missing from her home in Tacoma for three weeks, was found two days ago in the red light district and at the in-

stance of her parents sent to the state reform school. It is thought she was enticed away by a girl friend.

J. J. ANDERSON, a representative of an eastern steel company, has been in Tacoma arranging for a \$30,000 steel plant, to be constructed in that city.

JUDGE DENNY, in the superior court at Everett yesterday morning, held that the county commissioners have arbitrary authority in granting saloon licenses. The matter was brought up on an appeal from the refusal of the board to grant a second license to the town of Mukilteo.

GRANT M'KAY, a waiter at Walla Walla, tried to commit suicide by drinking an ounce of laudanum. He had lost about \$50 playing poker and was despondent. His wife found him in an unconscious condition. Two physicians were summoned and after two hours' hard work the man's life was saved.

DR. OTTO A. MARTINY, of Tacoma, pleaded guilty before Judge Snell yesterday to converting to his own use \$40 belonging to Margaret Hanley, of Eatonville. This was the specific charge for which he was arraigned.

EVERETT CITY officials have been served with a restraining order issued by Judge Danford, preventing them from interfering with the use of trading stamps in Everett stores.

# TO INTEREST GOVERNMENT

County Commissioner Baker and Deputy County Surveyor Teller left for Bellingham this morning, where they will confer with representatives of the government in the interests of better roads in the county. It is hoped that they can induce the government to allow the machinery of the public roads inquiry department to be brought here for a week after the good roads convention.

The county officials hope to get the government to make an extended test of road building and to construct the Rainier boulevard, which will save the county about \$5,000. The federal representatives are conferring with the different state and county authorities to secure information as to the best and cheapest way of building roads in the different sections of the country.

# UP IN TWO MORE WEEKS

### STEAMSHIP TOPEKA EXPECTED TO BE FLOATED DURING FIRST WEEK IN OCTOBER

The steamer City of Topeka, which sunk in 30 feet of water at her pier some time ago, will be raised within two weeks from today, according to statements made by the officials of the company this morning. Marcus Talbot, assistant general manager of the Pacific Coast company, says that the vessel will be floated in about ten days, providing the divers keep on at the rate they have been going of late. Mr. Talbot says that, in his opinion, the work of installing the timbers on the starboard side of the vessel will be accomplished in much less time than it took to place them on the port side. With the completion of the cofferdam, the vessel will be raised inside of two hours from the time the big pumps are started.

The balance of the cargo will then be removed, after which she will be towed to Moran Bros. company's ship yards, where the damages will be fully repaired.
