DEBS SCORES BOTH PARTIES

POINTS OUT WHY THE SOCIALIST PARTY IS THE BEST FOR THE WORKINGMEN OF THE COUNTRY

The new armory was too small to hold the people that greeted Eugene V. Debs, socialist candidate for president, last night. The eager crowd jammed and jostled each other as at a circus to purchase their 10-cent tickets. The Indiana labor leader was given an ovation that would have made a republican or democratic spell-binder feel triumphant for a week. For two hours the audience listened to the brilliant, epigrammatic arguments of the presidential candidate.

Debs made the usual socialistic arguments and ridiculed the pretensions of the two leading parties, declaring that they were both the same and interested in keeping the laboring man in slavery. He made a plea for the enfranchisement of women, saying that it would be given under socialism.

"The republican and democratic spell-binders will come here during this campaign and tell you how intelligent you are," he said. "We tell you how ignorant you are in order that you may become educated and vote yourself out of bondage. Fairbanks will tell you proudly that under republican administration the United States has become the greatest exporting nation in the world.

"He does not tell you that if workingmen were given the just share of the fruits of their labor there would be no exportation. The republican party uses the workingman to conquer in war foreign markets for goods that rightfully belong to him. The workingmen of one nation are arrayed against those of another on the battlefield for the benefit of the capitalist.

"Statistics show that wages in this country are decreasing in the same proportion that production is increasing. The capitalist uses the workingman just as he uses machinery. He pays him or his wife or child just enough for a bare subsistence and uses the profits for his own luxury. The only remedy is to allow the workers to own the machinery.

"The republicans will tell you that the country is prosperous, but I tell you hard times are coming. The press dispatches state, and I know it to be a fact, that there are 50,000 idle men in Chicago. They are desperate for want of food and the people of Chicago are afraid of being robbed in broad daylight. They are going about armed. The socialist party is the only one which will abolish this terrible condition—that is for the workingman and nobody else.

"Roosevelt claims to be a union man, but his record belies the fact. As governor of New York he ordered out troops to shoot down men who struck because the contractors would not conform to the state eight-hour law. He was delegated at the move of ex-President Cleveland when the latter ordered thousands of federal troops into Illinois and crushed the railway strike that had been almost won by peaceable means.

"As for Parker, he is the personal choice of John D. Rockefeller. The manager of the Democratic campaign is paid \$20,000 a year by the Standard Oil company. Both the capitalist parties are lubricated by Standard Oil.

"Davis is a coal baron of West Virginia, noted for his constant enmity to organized labor. He will not allow any of the men in his mines to organize. I went there once for that purpose and he succeeded in getting an injunction restraining me from leaving my hotel.

"The career of Debs has been spectacular. He is recognized today as one of the foremost writers, lecturers and organizers in the world. Forty nine years ago he was born at Terre Haute, Ind., and he resides there at the present time. He began life as a locomotive fireman, and subsequently became a clerk in a wholesale grocery house. He served as city clerk of Terre Haute from 1879 to 1883, and was a member of the Indiana legislature in 1885. For 13 years he was grand secretary and treasurer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, and president of the American Railway union from 1893 to 1897.
