FOOTBALL PLAYERS WAITING FOR WHISTLE

GAME THIS AFTERNOON BETWEEN WASHINGTON AND OREGON PROMISES TO BE ONE OF THE BEST OF SEASON

The University of Washington and the Oregon Agricultural college will battle for honors on the gridiron at the Madison park grounds this afternoon. In the estimation of the "U" boys the game will be the best one of the season. The Oregon squad, with its coaches and rooters, arrived in the city yesterday, headed by Manager F. C. Stimson. Manager Stimson says his players are in excellent condition, and ought to put up a fast game. The Oregon team gave Washington a hard rub last year, the latter winning by 5 to 0. This year Oregon has somewhat the advantage of Washington, inasmuch as her team is unchanged, with the exception of one or two of her best players who were unable to play last year, but who will be on hand this afternoon. Washington is made up to a great extent of new material, and it remains to be seen whether this year's line-up will be able to hold its own with the veterans from the south. Duke Brinker will again play at quarter, where he is dishing up the goods in fine shape. McElmon, Dean and Sigworth, who were injured in last Saturday's game, are now recovered sufficiently to enable them to play in today's game. The boys have shown up well during the week and will be "Johnny-on-the-spot" this afternoon. One excellent feature of Washington's playing is the assistance the boys give the runner in lifting him to his feet and carrying him along after he has been downed. From five to ten yards have been gained in this manner during the past events. Washington will have the same line-up as last Saturday, averaging in weight about 167 pounds. Oregon is reputed to tip the scales at from 175 to 180, but Manager Stimson says they will not go much over the weight of the Washington team. The grounds this afternoon will be in fine condition. Manager Stimson intends to build new bleachers along the side lines, as he fears the old ones will not accommodate the crowd. Following is the line-up of both teams: Washington Positions.
