CELESTINE BURNSIDE. "Dr. Hamilton seems to go in for phrenologist bumps, and they say he has been criticizing Mrs. Chadwick's bumps. If he would go around and feel the craniums of some of the men that were swindled by Mrs. Chadwick, perhaps he would find something worth his fee."

MRS. E. DOUGHERTY. "The London Court Records of a decade show that 89 per cent of criminals were men. Fifteen per cent of convictions were for lying (uttering false checks, promises to pay, restore, marry, fulfill, etc.). Of the number so convicted, 3 per cent were women.

"A woman cannot be a greater liar than a man, nor can a man be a greater liar than a woman. Their lines are interdependent in all things. HANLEY GOVERNOR OF INDIANA

Williams & Walker put up a show full of good things at the Grand opera house last night. The only fault to be found with "In Dahomey" was that there was perhaps a little too much of it. The fact that the clever bunch of chocolate colored artists kept the audience until after 11 o'clock was only pardonable because there was not a dull moment in the play and things moved so fast that time hadn't a chance to lag. The scenic effects were pretty and the costumes unusually good. Some of the gowns worn by the Ethiopian stars would keep Mrs. Leslie Carter guessing.

George Walker had the role of Rareback Pinkerton, the detective, and Bert Williams that of Shylock Homestead. In their own inimitable way the pair kept things moving, and a support of a clever half-dozing men and maids in addition to a good chorus made the show all it should be. Then, too, there was a lithe, graceful, sweet voiced little coffee colored dancing girl, Alda Overton Walker, who sang catchy songs and did pretty dances whenever there was a chance to squeeze them in. Nearly a round dozen lively airs were let loose to frolic and scamper through the attic chambers of those who heard on their way home. "Was a good show. "THE WESTERNER."

The new stock company at the Seattle theater had something hard to do last night—the task of entertaining an audience made critical by the splendid work of the Neill company in their long engagement. The play itself is not bad and the players were handicapped last night.
