AGED VETERAN UNDER ARREST FOR DEPRIVING UNCLE SAM. (Special to The Star)

CHICAGO, March 18.—When the civil war began Samuel H. Imel, then a young backwoods man of Pennsylvania, took up arms for the union so that his father, a man in the prime of life, could remain at home and care for the mother and daughters. Today Samuel H. Imel, now old and decrepit, was brought to the United States marshal's office on a warrant charging him with making a false affidavit so that he could secure a pension.

Some years ago Imel led his home in Pennsylvania after his wife's death, going to Mount Carroll, Ill., where he lived with a married sister. Deputy Marshal Griffith said when he entered the door of the little home he found Imel, now more than 60 years old, chopping wood. "You are under arrest," said the deputy, displaying a warrant and explaining its purport. "I can not read or write," declared Imel. "I never did anything at all. I gave the best part of my life to my country and was honorably discharged." Tears appeared in the old man's eyes, but he straightened himself and bidding good-bye to his sister, left for Chicago with the marshal.

ALL OVER A CHICKEN

A chicken caused trouble for Mrs. J. C. Edgerton, of Interbay, this morning. H. Higgins, a neighbor, according to the allegations of his complaint, was a target for revolver practice at the woman's hands a few days ago. Higgins and Mrs. Edgerton got into trouble over the chicken and Mrs. Edgerton fired one shot at Higgins, which imbedded itself in the door of his house. City Detective Byrnes and Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Van Derveer, after investigating the case, decided that the affair should be settled in court. The woman admits firing the shot at Higgins, but claimed that it was a 22 caliber revolver. Afterwards a search brought forth a 38 caliber revolver, which was hid under a mattress in the bed. She is charged with an assault with a deadly weapon.

HOTEL IS THREATENED

(Special to The Star.)

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 18.—The sea continues to eat into Coronado beach and much alarm is felt. The great hotel is being threatened, and a force of men are working night and day dropping bags of sand in front of the devastating waves. The boulevard has been eaten away and several dwellings are threatened. The wooden dwellings of Dr. Medier, United States army surgeon assigned to Fort Rosecrans, and George Gay are being moved. The fine brick residence of Graham Babcock and Grant Richards, which cannot be moved, are being fought for. Seven thousand bags of sand have been tumbled over the bluff and 20,000 more are to be used. The highest tide is yet to come Sunday, being the maximum, 6 feet 5 inches.

DO NOT NEED UNIFORM RATE

The Seattle Electric company and the Seattle-Tacoma Power company will be obliged to charge a uniform rate for electric lighting if they grant a request which Brady & Gay, attorneys, filed with the city clerk Friday afternoon. The council will probably take no action in the matter, as it will next Monday night establish the rate which is to be charged by the municipal plant, which is ready to enter the private lighting field. The municipal rate will probably be lower than the rate charged by either of the two private companies.

The rate sought to be established in the petition is 10 cents a kilowatt hour for the first ten kilowatt hours, and 2 cents a kilowatt hour for all light used in excess of that amount. The two companies are charging all kinds of rates at the present time, the small consumers being soaked for the benefit of the large ones. The Seattle Electric company is generally charging 12 cents a kilowatt hour for the first 60 hours, and 4 cents for amounts in excess of that, while the Seattle-Tacoma Power company is said to be secretly making a lower rate for this kind of lighting. For manufacturing purposes rates have been slashed, owing to competition.
