## THERY WON

FRENCHMAN AGAIN CARRIES OFF THE GORDON-BENNETT TROPHY

LASCHAMPS, France, July 5.—Two hundred thousand people watched the progress of the Gordon-Bennett automobile race today.

In the Auvergne mountains 7,500 soldiers guarded the course, which began at Laschamps and was 85 miles in length. Each competitor made the circuit four times, making a total distance of 341 1/4 miles. There are 400 turns in the course. The start was made at 6 o'clock sharp.

The French champion, M. They on a Richard Brazier, was the first to start. In a few seconds he was lost to view. Five minutes later the English champion, Clifford Earl, on a Napier, started. Jenatsy, the German winner of last year's race. He drove a Mercedes machine. Others followed five minutes apart. There were 15 starters. The Americans were: Little on a Pope-Toledo, Dingley on a Pope-Toledo and Tracy on a Locomobile.

They finished the last lap in 7:19 elapsed time and received a tremendous ovation. He also won the race last year. His machine is a 56 horse power.

Lancia, Italy, led at the end of the first circuit which was covered in 1:35. They was in second place, six minutes behind. In the third round the Italian had a breakdown and They resumed the lead.

## DROWNED

Supposedly seized with cramps, Albert J. Pickle, of Kent, sank in the waters of Lake Washington Tuesday afternoon, and despite the efforts of several persons to rescue him, was drowned.

The body was recovered later by Deputy Coroner Arnold and taken to the morgue, Pickle, with his mother and sister, came into town to spend the day early Tuesday morning, and in the afternoon Pickle went bathing.

He was 26 years old and unmarried. While the man was drowning the crowds at the boat house pavilion were dancing, unaware that a fellow creature was struggling with death only a hundred yards away.

The deceased was a son of Byron Pickle, who formerly owned a grocery store in Seattle, but who recently moved to Kent and purchased a farm near there.

## KILLS HUSBAND AND HERSELF

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—Jealousy prompted Mrs. Gertrude Dodgson to kill her husband yesterday afternoon and then to shoot herself. The couple were near the Hotel Northern when the woman was seen to fire a revolver at her husband's head. As he fell dead to the ground, Mrs. Dodgson turned the gun on herself and died shortly afterward in a hospital.

Dodgson wanted to go on the stage but his wife would not consent to it. They had been separate for some time, being brought together yesterday for the first time. They were married two years ago at Salt Lake. Dodgson's mother resides in Seattle.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—Of all the con games worked on the country bumpkins that are now massed in Portland, the most successful is the padlock game. This game is so simple that it surpasses belief that any man should be taken in by it, and yet more than a dozen people are poorer in sum ranging from \$50 to \$150 within the last month. J. P. Thornton, of Jerocho, Mo., was the last victim to be "shown." He met a confidence man yesterday and took a walk with him. On the way, as customary, the stranger picked up a rusty lock from the grass by the street and proceeded to try to open it with the key attached to it. While both men were looking at it, they were joined by a third. Thornton succeeded in unlocking it at once. But the first stranger made out he couldn't do it and then bet 10 cents with Thornton that the latter could not again force the lock apart. The stakes were given to the third man, who flashed a star on the two others and told them they were under arrest for gambling, but could put up \$100 bail, instead of going to jail. Thornton only had \$90 on him, which he yielded up.

## THEY PROTEST

PORTLAND, July 5.—An indignant protest has been made by five of the most influential Episcopalian ministers in Oregon over the recent election of Rev. E. J. Lloyd, D. D., as bishop coadjutor of the diocese of Oregon. They base their protest on the allegations of Rev. George E. Van Waters, rector of St. David's church, who, in nominating Dr. Lloyd before the convention, stated that he was a broad churchman and a graduate of Oxford university. Under this belief he was elected, whereas the facts are that Dr. Lloyd is a graduate of no university and is extremely high church. The clergymen claim that Oregon is low church in its proclivities and will endeavor to prevent the confirmation of the election.
