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FIGHT OVER BEER

Cries of "I won't pay for the beer!" "You will pay for that beer!" and the struggling forms of a woman an da man at the corner of Third and Washington, early Friday morning, attracted the attention of Patrolman Carleton, who summoned his brother officer, O'Connor, with several blasts of his whistle, and waded into the mix-up, thinking that murder might be done.

At the station the man gave his name as Edward Clark and told the police that he was drinking in the Belmont saloon on King when he thought they had overcharged him for a bottle of beer. He had trouble with Paul Allen over it and she followed him in an attempt to get the money for it. They got into a fight, in which Clark was hit over the head and cut and the woman was more or less bruised about the body. Both were charged with disorderly conduct.

FIGHTING DREAD YELLOW FEVER

NEW ORLEANS, July 28.—Governor Blanchard has returned from the state capital to perfect a state organization to combat yellow fever and mosquitoes in accordance with suggestions of the medical authorities.

Beginning this morning war organizations began a concerted movement to stamp out the disease. Every new case will be isolated and all physicians will be notified. The citizens committee has assessed every business man in the city according to his commercial rating, and none has refused. The yellow fever hospital is now filled with patients. The quarantine is apparently very effective.

RICHARDS FACES AN UGLY CHARGE IN UTAH

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 28.—Upon the charge that Commissioner Richards, of the general land office, has played into the hands of Mormons in opening to settlement the Uintah Indian reservation, the Gentiles of Utah have demanded his removal. It is asserted that in Richards' statement accompanying the proclamation he said the land was practically worthless, and this was used by the Mormons to discourage the Gentiles from taking up the land.
