Mangy Coyotes to Kill Relatives

MONTANA OFFICIALS TRYING AN EXPERIMENT IN HOPE OF KILLING OFF RANGE PESTS

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 4.—The

first experiment in ridding Montana ranges of coyotes by means of an infection will be made in Teton and Chouteau counties.

Dr. M. E. Knowles, under whose direction the experiments are being made, has shipped a mangy coyote to Teton county and one to Chouteau.

They will be turned out on the range by men who will endeavor to watch results and make report of them.

At the last session of the legislature an appropriation was made for the purpose of making an experiment in killing coyotes and wolves on the ranges by inoculating them with the mange.

Several months ago Dr. Knowles secured several young coyotes. During their confinement two died, but the others are husky. They have all been inoculated with mange, the two that have been sent to Teton and Chouteau showing the disease in a pronounced form.

Two or three that are still in confinement show the disease in a marked way, but the third, while inoculated, appears to be immune so far. Under the law the animals are to be turned loose in different parts of the state.

"The matter is an experiment," says Dr. Knowles, "and I hope it will prove a successful one. My only fear is that the infected coyotes, if turned out may get hold of poison before they get the chance to spread the disease."

"I have been feeding them meat and they will not be so sharp about letting poisoned meat on the range as are the wild ones. Still, I have hope, as this is the breeding season, that my diseased animals will get around some time before they meet death by the poison route."

"If they live four weeks they will spread the disease."

FUEBLO, Colo., Sept. 4.—The

first section of the Santa Fe passenger train No. 8, carrying hundreds of G. A. R. excursionists, was wrecked one mile east of Boone at 2:25 o'clock this morning.

Forty passengers were injured. The wreck was caused by the tank of an engine leaving the track. The train was going at such a rate of speed that it was impossible to stop before the engine and five coaches were overturned. Wrecking trains were sent out from Lajunta and Pueblo.

PHELHAM, N. Y., Sept. 4.—Reports

have been circulating for weeks that the ghost of the man who was killed in the explosion of the New York & Westchester Water company's pumping station in Pelham, and women and children have been afraid to venture out at night in Wolf's lane. In days gone by several persons took their lives in that vicinity and this added much strength to the ghost story.

IT WAS THEN discovered that a

screech owl with a cracked voice was the ghost. The bird was in a tree near the pumping station, and when the engine was exhausted steam escape it frightened the bird, which emitted unearthly howls. The posse caught the bird and wrung its neck.

WEDGED UNDER BARN; DIES

KENTON, Ohio, Sept. 4.—Selge Moore, aged 54, a prominent farmer who has been missing from his home, nine miles northwest of here, for the past four weeks, was found dead under the floor of his barn by his younger brother.

Moore disappeared one night, and as it was feared for some time that he was growing demented, a diligent search was made for miles around, but no trace could be found. While at work in the barn Joe Moore detected an odor and thinking there were dead rats in the barn, pried up the floor boards. He was horrified to discover the body of his brother lying face upward, but in such a decomposed state that the head had become separated from the body.

It was evident that the man had crawled so far under the floor that he became wedged in and suffered a convulsion while in this position, which left him so weak that he could not even cry out, and died of starvation.
