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JAPANESE IN OPEN REVOLT

INCENSED AT MANNER IN WHICH ENVOYS BACKED DOWN IN DEMANDS, MIKADO'S SUBJECTS RIOT AND DEMAND THE RESIGNATION OF THE GOVERNMENT

TOKIO, Sept. 6.—The official report announces the complete and crushing defeat of the remnants of the Russian forces after five hours' fighting at Nalutu, on the west coast of Saghalin. One hundred and thirty Russians were killed. The Japanese losses were slight.

A general feeling of chagrin throughout the country is apparent. The people at Yokohama are quietly awaiting the publishing of the details of the treaty.

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Sept. 6.—The Post says that, as a sequel to the peace treaty, the American and British governments, upon the initiative of America, will lay before the Chinese and Japanese governments suggestions for better regulation of American and British commerce in China, especially in Manchuria and Korea. They won't wait upon the other powers for action.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 6.—The street fighting at Khablof continues. It is reported that 30 soldiers were killed today. Flames in the Baku district are increasing in fury.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6.—Minister Griscom, Tokio, reports that the American ship Monterey was captured by Japanese and accused of carrying provisions for Russians between Siberian ports.

OYSTER BAY, Sept. 6.—Secretary Loeb announced this afternoon that Baron Komura and Minister Takahira will lunch with the president on Saturday. They come from New York on the Sybil. Saturday evening M. Witte and Minister Rosen will dine at Sagamore Hill. Telegrams from Portsmouth announcing the signing of the treaty to the president were made public today.

BOSTON, Sept. 6.—M. Witte's special train stopped here, en route to New York. The envoy visited Harvard and said he was delighted with America and its people and wished he could stay longer.
