

QUEEN ANNE CLUB HOLDS SPICY MEETING

SECOND AV. FRANCHISE DISCUSSED—COUNCILMAN CRICHTON SCORED—DONWORTH PLEADS FOR OCTOPUS

"Local men find it difficult to obtain positions with the Seattle Electric company unless they have some kind of a pull with Stone & Webster, the Boston owners. It seems that the latter have relatives and friends all over the state of Massachusetts, and whenever said relatives want a job they simply get a note from Stone & Webster to Jacob Furth. The job is furnished them forthwith. The local boys say that the best way to get a job from the company is to go back to Boston."—Secretary J. S. Bushnell at Queen Anne Improvement Club Meeting.

The same resolution which E. Shorrock introduced in the chamber of commerce on the joint use of street car tracks was presented to the Queen Anne Improvement club Monday night, and passed almost unanimously.

A second av. property owner and S. L. Lang, who made a typical Seattle Electric speech, were the only persons present who voted against it.

Attorney Donworth appeared in behalf of the electric company and made an heroic effort to prevail upon the clubmen to delay their vote, but it wasn't a go.

DONWORTH ARTFUL. Donworth is an artful pleader. At one time the able corporation counsel of the city of Seattle, he is now just as efficiently representing the electric octopus. Of serene and Washingtonian countenance, it is almost impossible to believe that he could tell a lie. In fact, many persons were not found out until a day afterward.

Donworth introduced himself as a friend and neighbor to the clubmen. He said he had lived with them on the top of the hill for 14 years—had ridden with them on the same cars, and also walked when the cars were not running. Having thus squared himself, Neighbor Donworth proceeded.

Donworth prior to this meeting," he blurted out at last. Donworth tried to drop through the floor. HANDS OUT HOT BUNCH. In reply, Secretary Bushnell said that Seattleites ought to be ashamed to acknowledge that they were dependent upon Stone & Webster, or any other eastern capitalists. He said that he was glad that Seattle had at last reached the point where it was no longer in the grasp of eastern capital, money having become so plentiful here that it was recently sent to Chicago. If Furth did not want the second av. franchise he did not see why he was making such an effort to obtain it. If Furth did not want it, he thought it best not to give it to him, as he had always proved able to take care of himself.

CRICHTON CRITICIZED. Bushnell and others criticized Dr. Crichton, councilman from the Eighth ward, severely. They said that he was a good neighbor and a very respectable councilman, but that when a crisis was at hand it had always been necessary for his constituents to march to the council chamber and fight for their rights. They scored him for demanding a petition from his constituents before voting against the franchise. They said it was up to him to ask THEM. One member declared that Crichton really knew the sentiment of the ward; that if he was not politician enough or he never would have been elected to the council. It was even insinuated that Crichton had fabricated in the matter.

MARKS HIMSELF CLEAR. Neighbor Donworth took occasion to make more clear his statement before the chamber of commerce that municipal cars using the Seattle Electric company's tracks on Second av. would drive the company out of business on the street. He said the company would be unable to compete with the city, not because the latter could operate its cars more economically and generously, but because it would have certain advantages.

These advantages, he stated, would be that the municipal system, as had proved to be the case in European cities, would be supported to some extent by general taxation. He also asserted that the city, instead of paying for the paving of track right-of-way out of the earnings of the system, as must a private company, would charge the cost up to the abutting property owners.

BRIDE OF FOUR WEEKS DRAINS GLASS OF ACID

"COME, JACK, HAVE A DRINK," SAYS TACOMA WOMAN AS SHE SWALLOWS CARBOLIC ACID

TACOMA, Nov. 14.—"Oh, come on, Jack. Forget it and have one drink with me." Addressing these words to her husband last night after he had severely scolded her, Mrs. Pearl Green, a bride of four weeks, residing at 723 Tacoma av., offered her husband a drink of what she supposed was whisky, and when he refused it she gave her head a coquetish toss and drained the glass, which contained nearly two ounces of carbolic acid. The deed was committed about 7 o'clock, and all night physicians labored with the unfortunate woman. Early this morning they said they had small hopes of her recovery. "I came home last night about 6:45 o'clock and found a woman whom I had told my wife not to as-

sociate with leaving the house. My wife was just changing her clothes, having been out on the street. Supper was not ready and the house had not been cleaned during the day. I scolded her severely and at first she seemed to take it very much to heart. Then she grew rather boisterous, and, going to the sideboard, willed a wine glass from a bottle of what I supposed was whisky. She asked me to make up and drink with her. When I told her I did not want a drink she drained the glass herself and then, with a scream of agony, fell upon the floor at my feet."

This brief statement was made by Jack Green, bartender in a Pacific av. saloon, and husband of the young woman, and is the only explanation known for her act.

MESSAGE WILL BE NOTABLE

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S MOST REMARKABLE DOCUMENT NOW BEING REVISED BY CHIEF EXECUTIVE

(Special to The Star) WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 14.—The proofs of the message that President Roosevelt will send to congress on the first Monday in December are now in his hands for final revision. It is said by those members of his cabinet who have heard portions of it that it will be the longest and most remarkable document that has been written by President Roosevelt. Among other topics that have been treated in a striking manner are the following: Corrections of the rebate evil and the regulation of railroad rates. Telling of what has been done toward building the Panama canal and advocating legislation that will expediate the work. Urging the reorganization of the diplomatic and consular service. Advocating moderation in Chinese exclusion laws. Suggesting methods for cementing up the cracks in the immigration laws. Recommending administrative reforms in governmental departments and the adoption of business methods in operating the government. Urging the ratification of the Santo Domingo treaty. Recommending better tariff relations with the Philippines and Porto Rico. Explaining the government's right to inquire into corporations engaged


