

# ACCIDENT SOME DAY

SINGLE TRACK ON UNIVERSITY LINE HAS ALREADY BEEN CAUSE OF COLLISIONS AND WILL RESULT IN TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE SOONER OR LATER — UNIVERSITY PROFESSORS PROTEST.

One of the chief car lines of the city, the patrons of which have been asking for a double track, is the University line. This line is one of the heaviest traveled and has the worst service of any in the city. Almost every morning workmen herring to get down town and students anxious to reach their classes at the university are held on switches waiting for some hand car to pass.

The regents of the state university during the past two years have taken up the matter in an informal way with the Seattle Electric company, but have received only promises of improvement. Determined to have some changes, the University Improvement club has also taken up the matter. Knowing that the poor car service has handicapped the growth of the community to a great extent, it has come forth with some suggestions for improvement which will be soon laid before the Seattle Electric company.

**In Constant Fear.**  
Fogs are a terror to the patrons of the line. In the past few years several collisions have occurred in which a number have been injured, and if the present arrangements are maintained it will only be a question of time when a fatal one will occur.

**Plan of Kittredge.**  
One of the plans offered for improvement is set forth by C. B. Kittredge, a resident of Brooklyn. "The line could be considerably shortened by the city opening up a boulevard from 9th and intersecting Eastlake at Denny way," said Mr. Kittredge. "Lake Union cars are the cause of an immense amount of time being lost. By running those cars over Howard av., a block west of Eastlake, it would allow fast time to be made to the old laundry. Here by following Eastlake around the edge of the hill east of Jensen's switch and thence on Franklin to the bridge at Latona a straight line could be secured, where as now innumerable curves prevent fast time."

**FALLS INTO BAY AND IS DROWNED**

T. J. MCARTHY, SWITCH FOREMAN FOR THE NORTHERN PACIFIC RAILWAY, LOSES HIS LIFE AT AN EARLY HOUR THIS MORNING.

While riding on a switch engine at Spokane and Fourth av. at an early hour this morning, T. J. McCarthy, switch foreman for the Northern Pacific, fell into the bay and was drowned. His body has not been recovered. McCarthy has not been working in the yards all night, visiting the various switches and their operators, and when nearing the Spokane av. switch he fell from the cow catcher and off the trestle to the bay below. The tide was in at the time, and, although the police

searched for over two hours, no trace of the body could be found. McCarthy has been employed in the Seattle yards of the Northern Pacific at intervals for the past six years, and has always been counted a valuable, careful and industrious employe. He was not known to be a drinking man. He was unmarried and when in Seattle lived at the Hotel Cadillac, Second av. S. and Jackson st. His family lives in Vancouver, B. C., where word of his death has been sent.

**MUNITIONS OF WAR SEIZED**
