

INSTALLATION PLAN MEETS APPROVAL

COUNCIL APPOINTS COMMITTEE TO ACT WITH CITIZENS IN ARRANGING FOR PUBLIC MEETING AT GRAND OPERA HOUSE.

Upon the representation of a committee of citizens headed by John Schram that the citizens desired a ceremony, the members of the council last night took steps towards arranging a public ceremony for the installation of the new city officials. This ceremony will be held at the Grand Opera house at 12:30 next Monday, half an hour after the new officials have assumed their offices under the provisions of the city ordinance.

A meeting held at the city hall last night it developed that there were some charter provisions which militated somewhat against the convenience of the public ceremony. One of these provides that each newly elected official must file his bond and oath of office with the city comptroller within 10 days from the date of his election or in this case by Saturday of this week.

Double Ceremony.
This provision will prevent the

administering of the original oath to the public officials at the public ceremony Monday. So the oath that is administered there will be a repetition of the official one by virtue of which the officers assume their offices.

The charter provides, also, that the new council shall convene at the council chamber at 12 o'clock on the day on which the members take their seats, the hour at which their term of office begins. This provision precludes convening at the Grand opera house at that time for the public ceremony, and makes it necessary for the public ceremony to be held at 12:30 instead of noon. Another council provision prevents any session of the council from being held at any place other than the council chamber.

Committee in Charge.

In the discussions at last night's meeting it was agreed that it would be possible to get around these provisions by holding the council meeting at the council chamber at 12 and by retiring as individuals to the grand opera house for the public ceremony half an hour later.

The committee of citizens which took the matter up with the mem-

bers of the council and new officials consisted of John Schram, Rev. Fletcher Wharton, J. W. Godwin, Josiah Collins, E. H. Cherrington, H. R. King and Dr. J. P. D. Llywy. President Gill, of the council, appointed a committee to work with this committee, consisting of D. W. Hogen, Ellis Morrison, R. T. Reynolds, T. P. Reveille, Frederick Sawyer, J. O. Kelso, Harry W. Carroll and A. G. Keene.

At the meeting last night Mr. Godwin reported that he had spoken to the proprietor of the Grand opera house about securing it for the ceremony and had learned that the house could be had without charge for that purpose.

REGRADE IS POSTPONED

Consideration of the protests against the big regrade scheme covering Pine st., Westlake boulevard and Belmont av. was last night postponed by the council for three weeks and will come before the new council. Immediate action was urged last night before the council by Attorney Vandever, but a large number of protestants who were present urged that the plan be postponed or amended.

Attorney Vandever represented to the council that an application is pending before the board of public works for a permit to build a seven-story building on the corner of Seventh av. and Pine st., which, if granted before the new street grade is fixed, will involve \$20,000 in damages to be assessed against the property paying for the improvement. Councilman Mullen interrupted with the statement that an ordinance was now on final passage establishing the street grade at that corner, which would be passed last night, thereby obviating such damages. After hearing a number of the protestants the council voted to put the hearing over.

MARINE NOTES

The stern wheeler steamer Capital City has reached Portland after a very stormy trip. For the last five years the Capital City has been operating out of Seattle on up sound routes, particularly to Olympia. Two months ago she was purchased by the Regular line of Portland for a run on the Columbia river and she was bulk-headed and made the trip safely.

Hind, Rolph & Co., operating sailing ships between the sound and Oriental ports, have given out the statement that they will build this year two large carrying steamers of 2,000 to 3,000 tons capacity. The steamers will not be ready until next year, but will undoubtedly be put on some route out of Seattle, most likely the home run.

Moran Bros. will repair the Portland lightship No. 50, which recently went ashore in a gale. The repairs will be extensive.

Four-masted schooner E. K. Wood has been relaunched at Ballard and is now in the bay, receiving caulking above the water line.
