action with which this office will act on its own initiative. If during the remainder of my term of office I find open gambling existing anywhere, I will not wait for any one else to act. I will see that it is closed, and kept closed.

Will Act on Request.

The only way in which this office would interfere in these matters would be in the issue of complaints for such violations of the law when such complaints are requested and evidence sufficient to convict submitted to me. Then, and only then, will I act.

"It has been my policy to allow organized towns in King county to conduct their own affairs. In the case of Georgetown there is a disposition to allow things to run wide open, and I have determined that the interests of the county at large will be best served by stopping open gambling there, and for that reason I issued the order to close all houses on April 1.



CINCINNATI, March 19.—General Henry T. Allen, commander of the Philippine constabulary, who arrived here today, says:

It is common to see patients brought to a hospital seek a chance to stick a knife into the doctor or nurse, and I have frequently seen women fight desperately beside men."

BERT GRAVES LEAVES OFFICE
