

SOL. G. SIMPSON IS AT DEATH'S DOOR

OLYMPIA, May 4.—Sol. G. Simpson of Seattle, one of the best known loggers in the state, is at death's door at his home in Shelton. Little or no hope is entertained for his recovery.

He is reported to be suffering from aneurism. Mr. Simpson was taken through the city last night on his way to his home in Shelton from California. He has been at Santa Barbara for some time in a vain search for his health. In response to his wish he was brought home, a special car being attached to a regular train for the patient and his attendants.

Telephone advices from Shelton yesterday afternoon state that he was unconscious at times and unable to recognize any one.

Mr. Simpson has always been popular with all of the loggers, nearly all of whom at some time or other have been in his employ. Many men in comfortable circumstances have given their first start through his generosity. He has amassed a fortune from the logging business and other enterprises since coming to the state, practically penniless twenty years
