SOME FADS IN WHITE HOUSE CHINA
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—If, as William Dean Howells says, the selection of china is the index of a woman's character, some of the former mistresses of the White House had very complex minds. In the basement of the historic mansion the visitor may see a sample of every set of tableware used since Abigail Adams hung her laundry to dry in the east room. The most ornate set was the choice of the fifth young daughter-in-law of President Van Buren, who presided over the mansion from 1823 to 1840, and from the few pieces now on exhibition it would seem that all American flora, fauna and bird life was depicted in detail.
Only Mrs. Madison, Mrs. Grant and Mrs. Roosevelt selected plain china decorated only with gold and the great seal. Mrs. Hayes' china was the most costly ever used in the White House, as every piece was different, hand painted and the work of selected artists in the French factory at Sevres.
